Ex-Indiana governor, HHS head Otis Bowen dies at 95

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) Otis R. Bowen, a small-town family doctor who overhauled Indiana's tax system as governor before helping promote safe sex practices in the early years of AIDS as the top federal health official under President Ronald Reagan, died Saturday. He was 95.

In a statement Sunday, Gov. Mike Pence said Bowen died Saturday at the Catherine Kasper Life Center, a nursing home in Donaldson, about 25 miles south of South Bend and near Bowen's hometown of Bremen. He did not disclose the cause of death.

"Gov. Otis R. Bowen's contributions to the life of this state and nation are incalculable, and I mark his passing with a sense of personal loss. His story is as inspiring as it is uniquely Hoosier," said Pence, who also expressed his sympathies to Bowen's children and grandchildren.

Bowen, known among Hoosiers for decades as "Doc," was a doctor in the northern Indiana town of Bremen when he first was elected to office in 1952 as Marshall County coroner, starting a political rise that

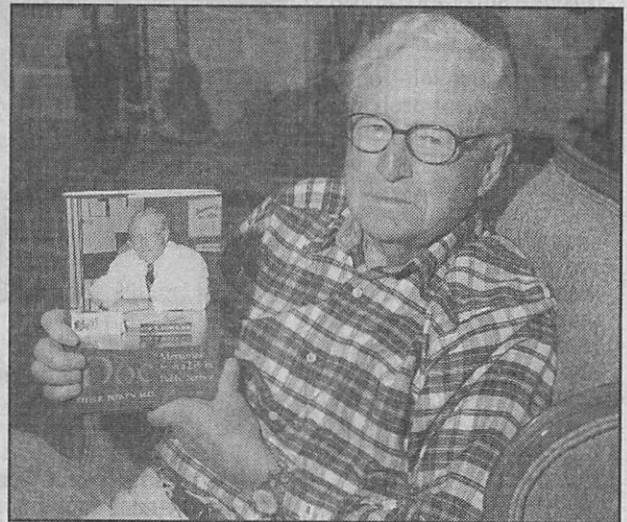
saw him become a wildly popular Republican governor during 1973-81.

He became secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in 1985, taking charge of the federal government's response to the spread of AIDS after the Reagan administration had been criticized by activists for a slow initial response.

Bowen promoted public awareness of the dangers of sexually transmitted diseases and worked with Surgeon General C. Everett Koop on the mailing to 107 million households of a pamphlet with explicit advice on how to avoid the AIDS virus, including using condoms.

During a 1987 news conference, Bowen gave a bit of advice that entered the national lexicon: "Remember, when a person has sex, they're not just having it with that partner, they're having it with everybody that partner had it with for the past 10 years."

Bowen, the stocky, bespectacled speaker of the Indiana House, won the state's top office in a landslide in

1972, beating former Democratic Gov. Matthew Welsh.

Bowen made state-backed property tax relief his top campaign pledge as those taxes had more than doubled in the previous decade. Legislation passed the next year doubled the sales tax to 4 percent and dedicating the extra revenue to property tax cuts. The proposal was

so hotly contested that it only passed the state Senate when Bowen's lieutenant governor, Robert D. Orr, cast a tiebreaking vote.

State Democrats responded with bumper stickers that said, "What's Up Doc? Taxes! Vote Democratic." But the public largely embraced the tax reforms, boosting Bowen's popularity.

Local fire chief organized search for hunter

A hunter contacted 9-1-1 and reported that he was lost in the woods near the Rodburn area in November. All the local emergency agencies came rushing to his aid.

It was actually dispatched that he called via cell phone and he was lost up in the Haldeman area around Penny Lane, said Haldeman-Hays Crossing Volunteer Fire Chief Jerry Bowen said.

Route 377 Fire Department, Morehead Fire Department and Rowan County Rescue Squad joined in on the search. The search began around 5 p.m. that fall evening.

Bowen coordinated the plan for the search and decided to have units split up. One unit went to search in the Rodburn area while the oth-

er unit went up the fire trail. It was on the fire trail that the man's automobile was discovered.

"He wound up parking his vehicle up on the fire trail on Big Perry and had ventured down to Rodburn Hollow that way," Bowen said.

Emergency crews went from where the vehicle was parked and hiked through the woods and began hiking west toward the Rodburn Hollow direction. The crews searched and searched and time ticked by. Still members of each unit trampled throughout the wooded area searching for the man. While the search ensued, emergency crews talked to the man on his phone. They did that to get a better idea of his location and they wanted to get a visual on where he was by his descriptions of his surroundings. It wasn't until around 10 p.m. that both units found him.

"We ended up boxing him in to where he was finally found," Bowen said.

Cell phones make searching for someone much easier. The definition of being lost has been redefined since the invention and use of cell phones. The invention of cell phones has really changed the way people are lost, he said.

"They are still lost. They are still in the woods. They are still in the weather. They are still unprepared for the situation at hand," he said. "Even though they had communication with somebody, that does not mean they are no less lost. They still do not know their way out."

It took all the agencies to pull together to get him out of the woods. If he did not have his cell phone, he would have been reported lost and by the next day he would not have come home and it would

have been a different story, Bowen said.

Lloyd Dean is a fireman, chaplain and board member of the Haldeman-Hays Crossing Volunteer Fire Department.

"Jerry organized it (rescue) into search groups," Dean said. "He stayed in touch with everybody. He's capable of doing that type of thing. He is not one for having loose ends and he covers all the bases."

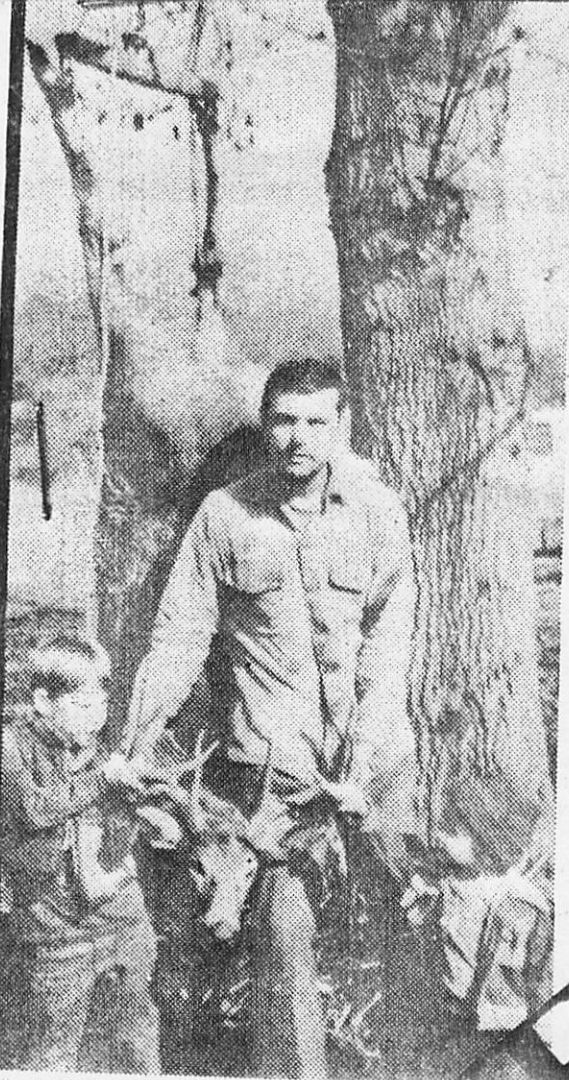

Trademore Donning Harvest Duds

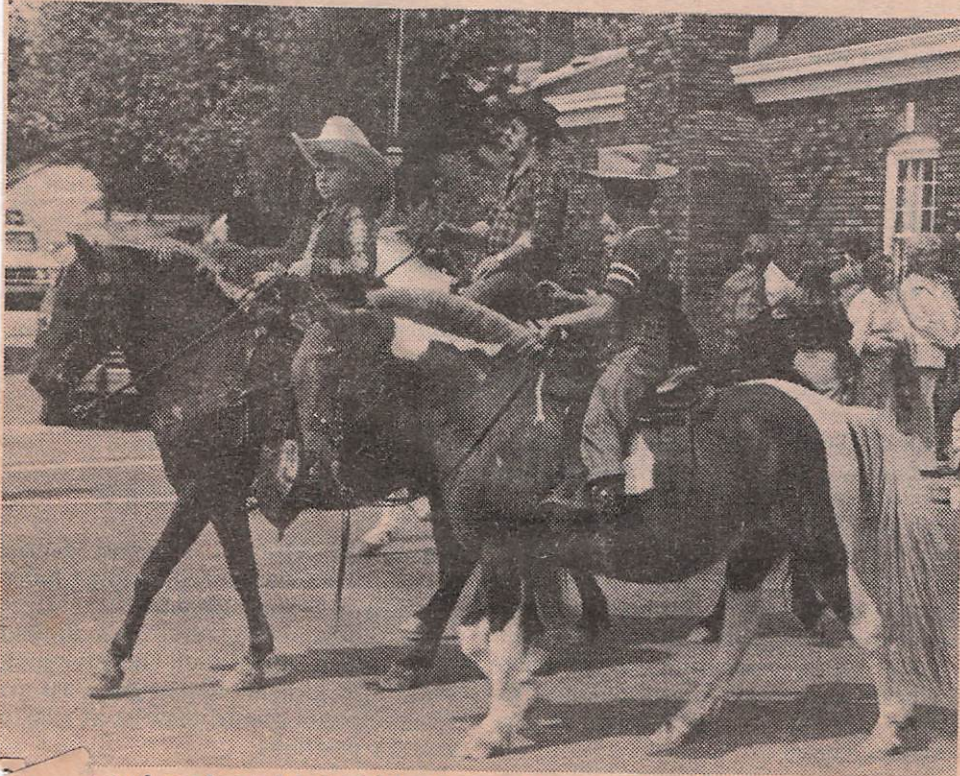
While downtown Morehead will have its quilt and afghan filled windows, merchants at Trademore will have their own window decoration contest.

Judging will be based on a harvest theme, and at press time, prize for the winning store was not known.

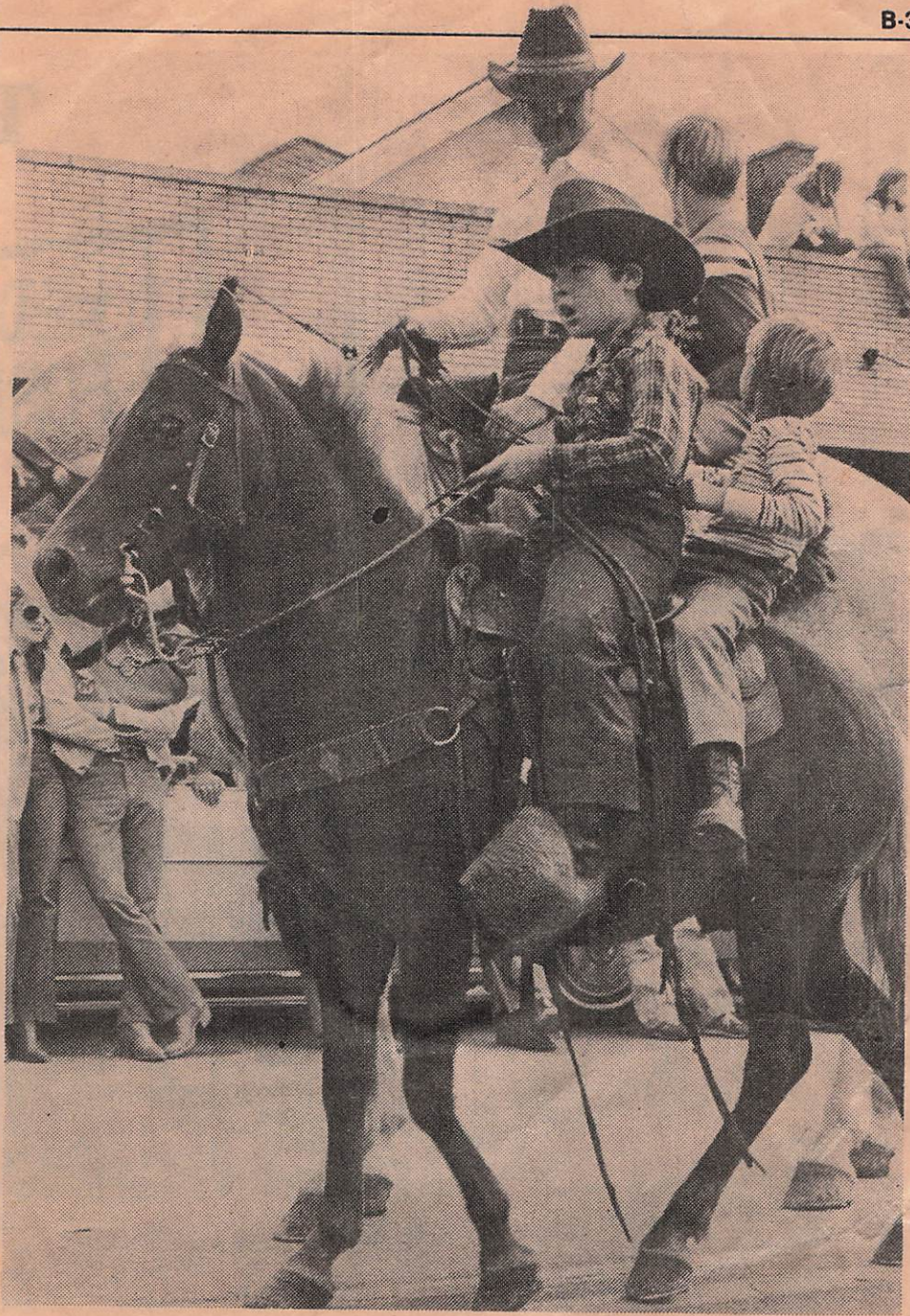
Among Trademore's employees, another contest will be going on over the festival weekend. Persons have

Everyone is invited to bring items for display about the school, brickyard, etc.

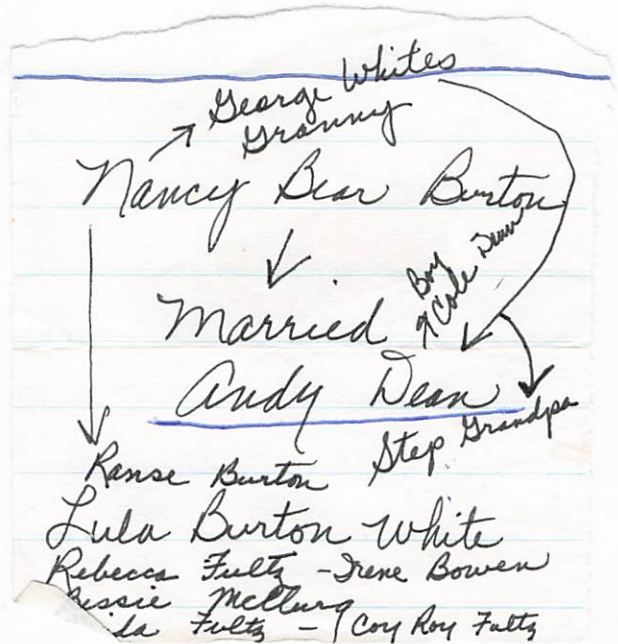


Rowan man killed in ATV accident

Brian Scott Bowen, age 26, of 1743 Haldeman Road, Morehead, Kentucky, passed away Saturday, September 7, 2002, at the University of Cincinnati Hospital in Cincinnati, Ohio. He was born July 25, 1976, in Rowan County, Kentucky, son of Jerome Bowen of Morehead, Kentucky, and Carol Liles Callahan of Ocala, Florida. In addition to his parents, he is survived by one brother, Jerry Bowen of Morehead, Kentucky; paternal grandmother, Irene Fultz Bowen of Haldeman, Kentucky; and maternal grandmother, Glendora Ginn Ramsey of Garrison, Kentucky.

Mr. Bowen was an electrician for the Tradesman Electrical Company.

FREDERICK BOWEN OF VIRGINIA
b. 1780 d. 1848 or 1852

My name is Nora Lee Walters and I will try to write down a history of the family of Frederick Bowen and Martha Patty Morton who were the first Bowens to settle in Montgomery, Powell and surrounding counties of Kentucky. Both were born in Virginia and married in Montgomery County, (now Powell) in 1798, the date that I would believe to be more correct as this is the date found in Montgomery County although to my knowledge no proof has been found. One source of information submitted by a researcher states 8 Dec 1793 and another states 1799. The data that I have collected was researched by the late Lydia Faulkner Hughes, genealogist, of Louisville and my cousin, Emma Benningfield Carpenter who now lives in Powell County. It was through the efforts of Mrs. Hughes that I joined the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. I continue to search for information from court house, archives and library records.

Martha Patty Morton was born in Pittsylvania Co., Virginia near Danville. She came with her widowed mother, Lucy Bleakley Morton to Kentucky when she was twelve years old, about 1796 or 1797, along with a large family of brothers and sisters. Lucy was the second wife of Captain John Morton,* a soldier of the Revolutionary War and the patriot that enabled me to join the DAR. Captain John had twelve children by Lucy Morton. My cousin, the late Nettie Bowen Trimble related to me that Martha Patty Morton was the 15th child of Captain John Morton. Martha Patty died at Bowen, KY on Red River before 1852 and before her husband. Frederick died during an epidemic which also took the life of his daughter, Nancy Bowen Faulkner. He was buried close to his daughter somewhere on the homeplace on Red River, Powell County.



Reason For Haldeman

Morehead did not have a city park until the summer of 1973, about 50 years after the Rowan County community of Haldeman had a city with elaborate flower gardens, tennis courts, croquet courts and croquet rings. Haldeman often hosted parties for these activities.

The fact is that Mr. L. P. Haldeman of Columbus, Ohio, founded the L. P. Haldeman Firebrick Company, offering good pay and working conditions for his men. He had in mind to build the perfect city possible for his community, and with his own money.

Mrs. Bowen, a resident of Haldeman since 1919, remembers walking from Tygart (8 or 10 miles one way) to Haldeman for \$2.27 a day. Bowen said this was good money for back then. "If you worked for Mr. Haldeman, you probably lived better than everyone else," he added.

Mrs. Bowen said that his first job at the L. P. Haldeman Firebrick Company was "digging" which included the opening and closing of doors to regulate the flow of air into the mines. Bowen later became a gardener and a miner.

Mrs. Bowen, a lifelong resident of Haldeman, remembers the town having a company hospital. "It wasn't like a regular hospital because it was used for Mr. Haldeman's employees if they were injured at work," she explained. She further added that Ms. Margaret Kegley of Morehead was the only nurse.

Haldeman Was Generous

Mrs. Bowen said that Mr. Haldeman was a very generous man. "He was good to work for because he cared about the people that worked for him," Bowen said. Some evidences of his generosity include the following:

cracking.

+ During the depression, Haldeman continued to work his men two or three days a week, even though he had no market for his product. Bowen said that he was concerned with the welfare of the townspeople.

+ Haldeman provided tennis courts, croquet courts, marble rings, a company hospital, athletic events, and a city park to his employes. Haldeman paid men to keep up the grounds of the above mentioned places.

+ Every Christmas, Haldeman paid a worker to find a large Christmas tree which would be placed at the park. Haldeman gave all the children of all his employes a gift at Christmas. "I remember going all the way to Elliott County to get a tree. It was all the bigger we could haul on a wagon," Bowen said.

+ Haldeman built a large brick home for his secretary, Mr. Becker. Haldeman also provided rooms and board for his visitors and associates.

+ There was also a company store which issued scrip money to the employes. If an employe was short on cash, he could pay with this money, and the amount would be deducted from his paycheck. The company store sold general merchandise.

+ The Developmental Company, also funded by Haldeman, built houses for people who worked at the brickyard.

+ Haldeman supplied all his employes with water. Water was drawn from various wells which were encased with brick. Water was stored in a large wooden tank. Bowen pointed out that when General Refractories bought the brickyards, this service was ended.

+ Anyone in Haldeman could join the Athletic Club which entitled their families free admission to all basketball and baseball games at Haldeman. The membership fee was \$1.50 per month.

Restaurant

"There was a dam in the back of the first (or upper) brickyard. We used to go fishing, skating and swimming at the dam," reminisced Mrs. Bowen.

During the prosperous peak of Haldeman, three general merchandise stores were utilized by its citizens. The railroad depot provided the major means of transportation to the people.

Brickyard Opened

In 1902, Haldeman opened his first brickyard (the upper yard) which was operated by steam. According to Mrs. Bowen, the men brought clay out of the hills and took it to the yard. The clay would be ground in a "dry pan" and then placed in a "mud pan". When the clay became muddy it was placed into a mold.

The clay was then placed on a "dry floor" to dry. It was then taken to the kilns to burn. Laborers stacked the finished bricks to one side of the yard waiting for their sale.

Bowen said he had been told that Mr. Haldeman had as many as 500-600 people working for him at one time. "This used to be a nice little place with nice houses," Mrs. Bowen recalled.

When asked the reason why Mr. Haldeman sold out, Bowen failed to comment.

However, when the union was suggested, Haldeman said that his men did not need a union. He believed that his men were paid well, and had good working conditions. (The work day at the brick yard consisted of eight or ten hours).

Nevertheless, after the union came to Haldeman, the town began to slowly deteriorate. The union may not have been the culprit but the event happened at about the same time according to a man who wished to remain unidentified.

Mr. Andrew "Andy" Offutt, whose family occupies the Becker home which Haldeman built, said, "I don't know what was the union that caused the problem."

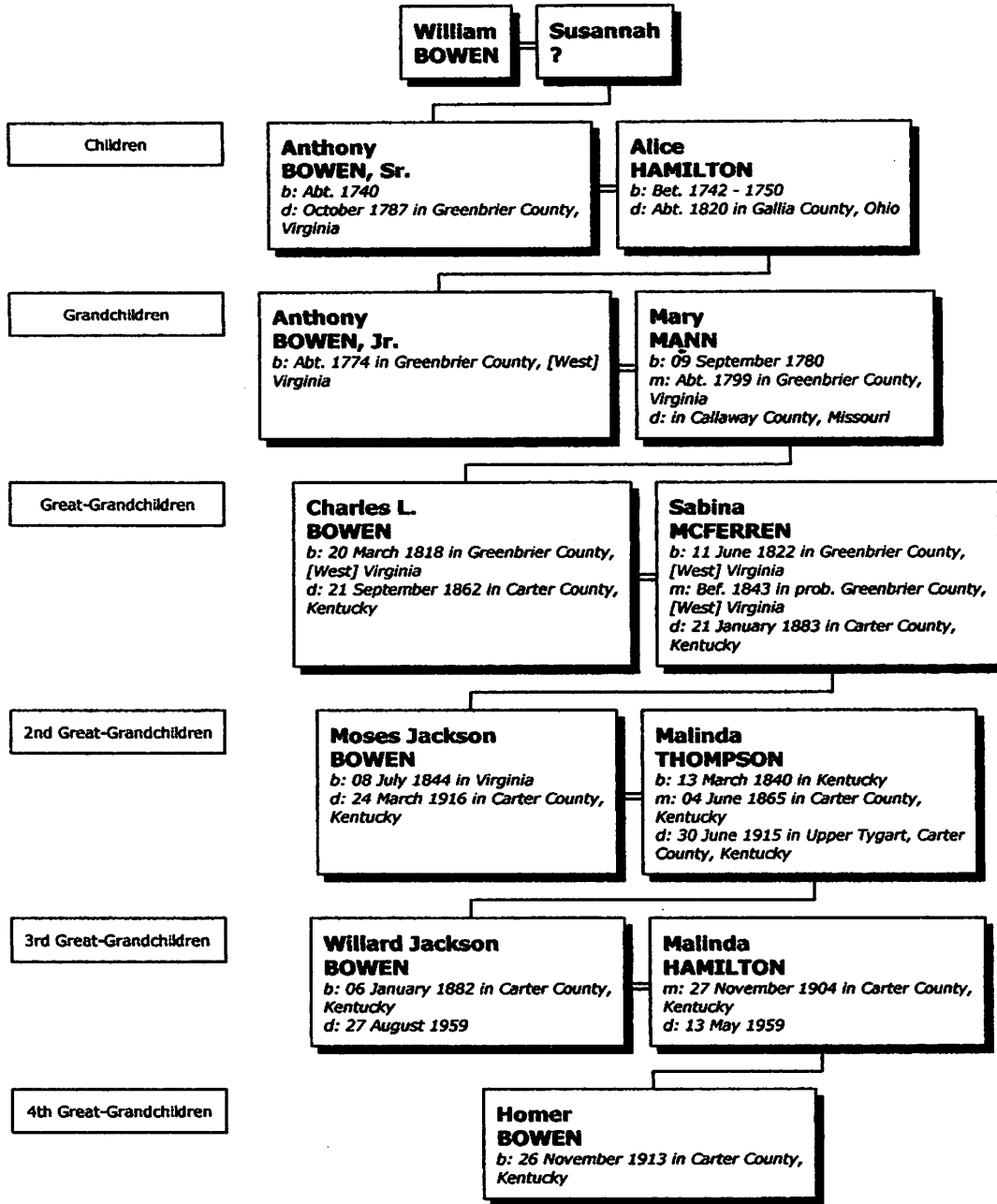

FREDERICK BOWEN OF VIRGINIA
b. 1780 d. 1848 or 1852

My name is Nora Lee Walters and I will try to write down a history of the family of Frederick Bowen and Martha Patty Morton who were the first Bowens to settle in Montgomery, Powell and surrounding counties of Kentucky. Both were born in Virginia and married in Montgomery County, (now Powell) in 1798, the date that I would believe to be more correct as this is the date found in Montgomery County although to my knowledge no proof has been found. One source of information submitted by a researcher states 8 Dec 1793 and another states 1799. The data that I have collected was researched by the late Lydia Faulkner Hughes, genealogist, of Louisville and my cousin, Emma Benningfield Carpenter who now lives in Powell County. It was through the efforts of Mrs. Hughes that I joined the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. I continue to search for information from court house, archives and library records.

Martha Patty Morton was born in Pittsylvania Co., Virginia near Danville. She came with her widowed mother, Lucy Bleakley Morton to Kentucky when she was twelve years old, about 1796 or 1797, along with a large family of brothers and sisters. Lucy was the second wife of Captain John Morton,* a soldier of the Revolutionary War and the patriot that enabled me to join the DAR. Captain John had twelve children by Lucy Morton. My cousin, the late Nettie Bowen Trimble related to me that Martha Patty Morton was the 15th child of Captain John Morton. Martha Patty died at Bowen, KY on Red River before 1852 and before her husband. Frederick died during an epidemic which also took the life of his daughter, Nancy Bowen Faulkner. He was buried close to his daughter somewhere on the homeplace on Red River, Powell County.


