He was the son of John Cornett. While a resident of Buckingham County, Va., in 1779 he enlisted in the Revolutionary War and served six month in Capt. Anthony Winston's Company, Col. Scripps Va. Regiment. In 1780 he re-enlisted as a private, and served six months in Capt. Saunders Co. Col. pattersons Va. Regiment.

He was allowed a pension on his application executed Aug. 12, 1833. (W6723)

wanting to be buried in this particular place was that he dreamed that he drove his wagon and team upon the hill to a large Sassafras tree and could never drive them out from under it, so he requested his family to bury him under this tree.

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and four children, Joe, Solomon, Nellie and Mary.

The widowed mother lived with her four children for a few years enduring much hardship; one day the two boys, Joe and Solomon were out strolling about the place and when they returned to the house they found their two small sisters tied to the bed post and their mother was gone; she was never heard of any more.

The neighbors learned about the cchildren being left without anyone to care for them and took them into their homes and cared for them until they were able to care for themselves.

Soon after the girls were grown up, Mary Everage married *Wm. Cornett; (1761-1836) in Sul!ivan County, Tenn. They soon moved to Ky. Joe and Solomon came to Kentucky with them. Nellie married Ben Johnson of Raleigh, N. C.

Joe Everage married Silver Griggsby and settled on Betty Troublesome Carrs Fork. Solomon Everage married Katie Ison and moved to Rowran County, Ky. He had a son named Samp Everage that came back to Perry County and married Mary Kelley, daughter of Nathan Kelley and went to Ark.

Stephen Creech married Sally Gilliarn, (born Dec. 8, 1808, died July 7, 1894).

She was the daughter of William Gilliam who was a brother to William Cornett's first wife, Rhoda Gilliam.

Stephen Creech and his wife, Sally Gilliam settled on Clover Lick Creek in Harlan County Ky., near a large spring oh the left side of the creek as one goes up the creek, about two miles from the mouth of the creek.

To them were born three girls, Katie, Elisabeth and Polly.

While Polly was very young, Stephen went to New Orleans, La., and stayed there one year. When he came back home he brought with him a negro slave, named "Jack."

In a short time he began to arrange to go back to New Orleans and Gake Gilliam (his brother-in-law) decided to go with him. Creech said to some of the folks, "If Gake

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goes with me he will not know any more about my business down there when he comes back than he does now."

So when they arrived in New Orleans they went to a Hotel and registered. Creech was pretty busy most all the time, going from place to place arranging to start back home on a certain day, but he was careful that Gake Gilliam did not go about with him but little. So in a few days they were ready to start back home. Creech had another negro slave in possession and he asked Gilliam to keep the slave at a particular place until he went a short distance to see a man on some business. Gake Gilliam waited for such a long time that he decided that he was not comings back so he and the negro started hunting for him but they could not find him; so Gake Gilliam told the negro to go back to his master and he came back home.

Stephen Creech was never heard from any more.

The slave ("Jack") that Creech brought home with him would never tell about how Creech got possession of him. One time he said, "A nice man from this country can go down there and marry well off some times."

Some of "Jack's" generation are in Harlan County.

Sally Gilliam Creech stayed at home and raised her three girls up to womanhood.

Katie married Wm. B. Campbell; Elisa-

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beth married Arch Cornett; Polly married Charles L. Cornett.

Stephen Creech's brother, Gib Creech, was a soldier in the Union Army. He was accused of ambushing some of Major Chineworth's men and was captured and brought into the Confederate Camp on Big Leatherwood Creek; Major Chineworth asked him if he had been bushwhacking his men and Creech answered "Yes, and I will bushwhack again". Chineworth's answer was, "It's damned uncertain."

Creech was courtmartialed and shot on the lot where M. C. Cornett's dwelling now stands. He was buried in the P. H. Hall cemetery.

WILLIAM CORNETT'S FIRST VISIT TO KENTUCKY

About the year A.D. 1796, William Cornett and Gideon Ison came from Virginia to Ky., on a hunting expedition, as game had become scarce in that part of Virginia in which they lived. They had been informed that there was lots of bear, deer and other game in Ky., so they decided to come and see; though they were a little fearful as they often heard that

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there were still roving bands of Indians in that part of Ky. where they had heard that the bear and deer were; but the temptation was so great that they could not resist, so they began to prepare to make the trip.

After gathering their equipment which consisted of corn meal, ax, long-handle skillet, hunting knife, powder, bullets, pouch, flints, blanket and flintlock rifles they put their packs on their horses and started for the "Happy hunting ground."

When the two hunters crossed over the Big Black Mountains into "Kaintuck" they became more fearful of the Indians as the name "Kaintuck" made them think more about what they had heard, of the "Dark and bloody ground" but they were too much determined to make the trip to back out so they kept on their way.

After two or three days travel they came to the mouth of Beech Fork on Big Leatherwood, Perry County, Ky. At this point there are some twenty or thirty acres of level land which was covered with the finest timber they had ever seen and they saw signs of plenty of game, so they decided to set up their first camp in Ky.

While preparing their supper the hunters talked of the beautiful level land and of the feasibility of

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would mature in this country.

They felt pretty sure that all their native crops would mature but to be sure they decided to cut down a beech tree and come back the next month of June and if the bark on the tree had bursted from the effect of the sun that would be a sure sign that all their native crops would mature.

Early next morning the hunters arose very much enthused with the prospects of the new country. One of them decided to cut down the beech tree while the other prepared their breakfast.

After breakfast they decided to make an extended hunt for bear and deer as this kind of game was the cause of their coming to Ky.

After hitching their horses securely to Leatherwood bushes which were growing thick in the Beech Fork bottoms they started out for the days hunt; one going up the creek and the other down the creek in order to explore all the country possible on that day.

Gid Ison had not traveled more than two hours when he came upon a smouldering fire. After investigating the surroundings it was obvious that Indians had encamped there the previous night. So the first thought that entered Ison's mind was the danger of being scalped and killed by the Indians, so he did not hesitate but retraced his steps as fast as he could

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back to his horse as he put great confidence in his horse carrying him out of danger.

After returning to his horse he began to think about his friend and companion; he knew that he was fleet footed and alert; in everly respect able to compete with most any redskin single handed, but this thought did not relieve him of the great fear he was under; he was fearful of the Indians capturing him or murdering him in any way they could; he finally decided to wait for him at the camp until dark and if he did not come by the time the first star appeared in the sky he would mount his horse and start for his home in Va. So he tramped about his horse the remainder of the day; such a day of worry he had never known; waiting, watching and hoping that he might see his companion coming into camp.

At last the dark shadows of night began to gather around him, he slowly unhitched his horse and leaped upon his back; he thought that his companion could be lost in the thick wooded country so he decided to leave his horse and all the camp equipment and go home. So the time had come that he had set to start back to his Virginia home; he could now see the first star. He turned in his saddle to scan the direction that he was expecting his companion to come and to his great pleasure he saw him coming toward him some distance away so he dismounted and

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hitched his horse the way he had left him that morning and acted as if he had suffered no uneasiness; he did not want his companion to know he had acted so silly; he never would have acknowledged it had he not been caught up in it.

William Cornett or "Billie", as he was called by his family and friends, came into camp with a small deer on his back which he had killed that evening.

Usually when a hunter killed a deer they would skin one front leg and one hind leg from the ankle to the knee and take the bones out and tie the legs together and carry them shot-pouch fashion so this was the way "Billie" was carrying the little deer.

Soon after "Billie" Cornett came into camp he began to prepare the venison for supper. Ison stood by not having much to say, the great strain that he had labored under for the last six or seven hours had left him almost speechless. At last Billie Cornett broke the silence by asking this question. "Gid what was you on that horse for awhile ago? Gid Ison then knew that Billie Cornett had seen him on his horse and he then began to talk freely, telling about the Indian sign and that he had imagined that they had killed him and that he was aiming to start for home soon as he saw the first star; then Billie Cornett broke into the conversation saying "Damns to hell if I didn't see one's head stuck over a log today". He said that

the Indian was in front of him as he was coming toward the camp and that he walked straight ahead pretending that he did not see the Indian until he passed him, then he started to run; after running a short distance, he looked back to see if the Indian was after him and saw him running at high speed in the opposite direction.

So they prepared and eat supper very quietly and then began to pack their camping outfit preparatory for an early start for home next morning.

The thought that the Indians might attack them during the night was so impressed on their minds that they did not try to sleep but sat quietly by their packs all night and when the light of day began to show on the eastern sky they mounted their horses with their scanty belongings and were immediately on their way back to their Virginia home.

We have no history of their returning to the Beech Fork bottoms to see if the bark on the Beech tree which they had cut down had bursted but we do know that they soon came back to Kentucky and that Gid Ison settled on Line Fork in Letcher County and William Cornett settled at the mouth of Full Creek in Perry County.

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WILLIAM CORNETT'S AND MARY EVERAGE'S COURTSHIP

During the last few years of William Cornett's first wife's life Mary Everage lived near their home with her two little girls. She was very industrious and was always ready and willing to help Mrs. Cornett with her work, so they became good friends.

When Mrs. Cornett became sick (which was unto death) Mary Everage stayed with her and cared for her all the time that she could.

After Mrs. Cornett had been sick for some time she decided that she could never recover so one day she called her husband to her bedside and said to him:

"Billie, it looks like I am going to die. When I am gone you will have a hard time raising the children by yourself. I think that it would be well for you to get you another wife to help you raise them. Mary Everage is a good woman and would make you a good wife; you and her could raise your children up together and get along all right. I think it would be the best for you". "Billie" Cornett could not speak for some time. Finally he said, "Rhoda, I don't think that I will ever want another wife. I cannot consider that now."

She said, "Well, I think that it would be well for you to consider it."

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It was not long after her death that Billie Cornett began to see the need of a mother's hand; there was no one to cook his meals, no one to take care of the children while he was working in the field or out hunting, no one to wash their clothes or clean the house; he felt that life was not worth living under such circumstances though he was determined not to marry any more.

One Saturday morning Mary Everage learned that "Billie" Cornett was compelled to be away from home that day on particular business and would be gone all day, leaving the children to take care of the home, so she decided to take her two little girls and go up to his home and stay with them that day.

When she arrived at the house she readily saw that Billie Cornett was a bad housekeeper, so she began to work, the larger children helping her; by late evening she had cleaned the house, washed the children's clothes and had everything looking like it did in Rhoda Cornett's days when she was able to work.

She ironed the children's clothes and had them to wash themselves and put on the clean clothing. After this she cooked their supper and departed for home.

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She felt very tired as she walked toward home but at the same time felt enthused over the thought of having done one more days work for her good friend and neighbor, Rhoda Cornett.

Billie Cornett arrived at his front gate just as the shadows of night began to fall on the threshold of his home, one of his little girls came running to meet him, crying out, "Look here I am all cleaned up, Mary Everage has been here with us all day. She left just a few minutes ago."

Billie Cornett walked on into the house. When he beheld his children in their clean clothes, the house

cleaned and everything looking so much like he had so often seen it during his wife's life, he almost felt that a mother's hand had been there.

The children had many things to tell him about Mary Everage having them to help her about the work and their many experiences during the past day; but their father did not have but little to say to them. His thoughts were running on the council that his wife had given him, "Mary Everage would make you a good wife."



The John Baxter Cornett Story

Cornett, John Baxter, 5th Sergeant-Co. H December 16, 1837-October 1, 1910 By Richard Glenn Brown

Another one of our goals is to share the individual stories of our Appalachian ancestors that helped mold us. For we can never really understand who we are until we know who they were. A saying that always weighs heavily upon my heart is, "If we do not remember our ancestors then we are not worthy to be remembered by our descendants." The story below typifies the struggle for survival and how it tore asunder the families of Appalachia, as one chose blue and one chose gray.

John B. Cornett, known simply as J.B., enlisted on September 29, 1862 in Whitesburg, Kentucky and was assigned to Company H. He was married to Elizabeth Hays (1847-1923) and was the brother to Pvt. Samuel A. Cornett, also attached to Company H. He was the son of Joseph E. Cornett (he had served in the 5th Ky. Infantry, was wounded in the hip, and had been the 2nd Judge of Letcher County) and Sarah Brown Cornett. Surrounded by relatives, the Brown family lived on Dry Fork approximately 1/2 mile from the Cornett's cabin. In the truest sense of the word, this family was torn asunder by the ravages of the war. Benjamin Brown of Dry Fork owned a small grain mill and was a part time surveyor. His small log cabin often entertained the Cornett nephew that now wore gray while his sympathies lay with the blue clad soldiers. In fact, he and some of his sons were part of the Union home guard.

The year of 1863 saw constant fighting and bushwhacking from both sides that culminated in Colonel Ben Caudill (a first cousin to Ben Brown) issuing orders for the arrest any of the pro-union sympathizers that were harassing those supporting the cause of the Confederacy. To reduce the risk of blood shed, he sent 5th Sgt. John B. Cornett, the nephew of Ben Brown to make the arrests. Fifth Sgt. Cornett was no stranger to the ravages of war and probably had a dislike for union soldiers because of his previous experiences with them. The Harlan Battalion had captured John prior to this assignment and also a cavalry unit had raided his family's farm, taking food, livestock and turning over the beehives. When asked by a family member what they would feed the children, the Union officer replied, "Thope the bees sting you all to death and you can all eat browse for all I care."

A Company was attached (probably Co. H) and they set out on the four-mile ride to capture those in question. The Browns boys received word that the Cavalry was coming to arrest them and they went in the woods to hide. Ben Brown stayed behind to talk to the soldiers. Upon the discovery that the boys had managed to allude them, the patrol became furious and arrested Ben in hopes of luring out his family members. Sgt. Cornett told his wife to instruct his boys that if they ever wanted to see their father again, they had to turn

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wayward flock back to the truths of the teaching of Christ as love overcame and reason prevailed on that day.

Reverend J. William Jones also offers keen insight into the Christian nature of Lee, the man. He had served with General Lee as a Pastor of Lee's flock and became a close friend of the family. He was the author of two books that helped establish Lee as more that a man: a famed myth in which legends become known. He wrote, "If I have ever come in contact with a sincere, devout Christian, one who, seeing himself to be a sinner, trusted alone in the merits of Christ, who humbly tried to walk the path of duty, looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith, and whose piety was constantly exemplified in his daily life, that man, was the world's great soldier, and modern man, Robert Edward Lee."

He was the son of John Cornett (Canute) who is believed to be one of seven brothers who immigrated together from England ca. 1740. William died 26 November 1836. Mary died 28 January 1852. They are buried in the Cornett Family Cemetery at Cornettsville, Kentucky.

"Robin" has one granddaughter named for him. She is the daughter of Odis, son of George and Electra. Robin died 30 March 1913 and is buried in the Cornett Cemetery at the mouth of Big Branch. Lake Cornett, Lisa (Cornett) Price

CORNELIA (AMBURGEY) and ROBERT SAMUEL CORNETT Robert Samuel Cornett Jr. was born 25 May 1878, died in 1962, the youngest of twelve children. He inherited property in Knott County from his father, Robert Samuel Cornett Sr., who inherited it from his father, John Cornett Sr.

John Cornett Sr. was born in Washington County, Virginia in 1794, died in 1871. He married Rachel (Smith) and moved to Clay County, Kentucky in 1818. He obtained a grant for five hundred and fifty acres of land in Knott County, including all of Sassafras Hollow and the bottom land along Carr Fork Creek. He built a log home on the east side of Sassafras Hollow and had ten children: Robert Samuel Sr., John Jr., Arch, Rusel, Rhoda, Mary, Elizabeth, Frankie, Nancy, and Harden.

Robert Samuel Cornett Sr. married Adeline (Brashear) and built a home on the west side of the hollow and had twelve children: Manton, Theopolis, who died in infancy, twins Jasper and Newton, Elizabeth, Rachel, Rhoda, Nancy, William Riley, John Dixon, Mary and Robert Samuel Jr.

Robert Samuel Cornett Jr., married Cornelia (Amburgey) 09 January 1900 and had nine children: Vida (Cornett) Combs, Mae (Cornett) Martin, Ewel B. Cornett, Miriam (Cornett) Blankenship, Carson H. Cornett, Hester (Cornett) Smallwood, Leo Dicy (Cornett) Cline, Zeda (Cornett) Watts, and Irene (Cornett) Lovelace. In 1912 he built a two story six room home to replace the old one and later added a kitchen and dining room wing with bedrooms upstairs.

He was told by census takers that he had the most modern farm house in the area. He had purchased a Delco Home Lighting System in 1927 and generated electricity for lights and appliances and piped water from a spring to the kitchen and bathroom.

He farmed the land by the sweat of his brow to provide for family, livestock, and to help others but encouraged his children to get an education and seek other employment.

He once was Magistrate in his district, was president of Peoples Bank in Hazard, Kentucky, was a veterinarian, set broken bones, owned a sawmill, pulled teeth with a homemade tool from his Blacksmith Shop and could make anything from horseshoes to farming tools. He was a Godfearing Christian, a man of his word, and promoted citizenship, obedience, and honesty.

He gave land for a Presbyterian Missionary Church, a Parsonage, and school in 1902, which became St. Nicholas High School in 1921. He boarded the transported teachers and kept many children so they could get an educati graduat coal mi to Vicc is now

RHODA (GILLIAM), MARY (EVERAGE) and WILLIAM CORNETT William Cornett was born in Henrico County, VA in 1761, and was the son of John Cornett of Virginia. William left Virginia and settled in Perry County, KY and was the first known Cornett to inhabit the area. He and his first wife, Rhoda Gilliam, had four children: John, Arch, Lucy and Elizabeth Cornett.

After William's first wife died, he married Mary Everage and they had seven children: Robert Bustard, Roger, Nancy, Rachel, Samuel, Nathan Woll, and Joseph Cornett. William died on November 26, 1836 and was buried in Perry County, KY. Some of his children settled in Knott County.

Nathan Woll Cornett (/2/1811-1/12/1889) was one of the sons of Mary Everage and William Cornett. Nathan Woll marred Liddia Caudill, daughter of Sara Adams and Steven Caudill, and settled in Knott County, KY. Liddia Caudill and Nathan Woll Cornett had ten children: Joseph E., Rachel, Sally, Mary, Nancy, Polly Ann, Easter, Roger, Benton, and Robin Cornett.

Joseph Cornett (3/17/1836-8/1/1917) was one of the sons of Liddia Caudill and Nathan Woll Cornett. Joseph met and married Susanna Caudill (3/6/1841-12/4/1899) and they had twelve children: Nathaniel Green, Watson, John, Samuel, Jeptha, Sara, Mary, Martha, Margaret, Sally, Jane, and Nancy Cornett. Joseph and Liddia owned several hundred acres of land on Big Branch, near Hindman, KY and most of their children also owned land near Hindman.

Susanna died December 4, 1899, at the age of 58, and Joseph never remarried. Joseph continued to live on Big Branch until his death on August 1, 1917. They were both buried in the Cornett Family Cemetery on Big Branch.

Jeptha Cornett (4/23/1875-3/7/1919) was born April 23, 1875 on Big Branch, near Hindman, KY, a son of Susanna Caudill and Joseph. Cornett.

Jeptha met and married Ruthenia Smith (7/16/1881-9/8/1967), daughter of Nancy Owens and Samuel Smith. Ruthenia and Jeptha had eight children: Susie (6/6/1899-6/25/1987) who married John Terry; Sylvania (2/7/1901-3/9/1918) who died of the flu shortly before her 18th birthday, and who was engaged to be married; Melvin James (1/13/1903-11/13/1990) who married Martha Madden; Watson E. (2/16/1905-7/10/1982) who married Herma Everage; William Dennis (4/8/1909-7/7/1988) who married Maude Lee Lawson; Henry Delmas (4/21/1911-6/30/1979) who married Hazel Davidson; Gordon (born/died 12/26/1917); and Orpba (born 2/3/1919) who married James Edward Bentley.

After Jep died on March 7, 1919 from complications of the flu, Ruthenia Cornett married Alex Bentley in 1924. Alex had four children from a previous marriage; two boys and two girls. Only one daughter named Sadie Bentley lived to be an adult. She left Knott County at an early age and moved to the state of Washington and then to Oregon where she died in May 1993. Ruthenia and Alex also adopted a little girl named Dallie Bentley when she was about six months old. Alex was killed by a train while working in the state of Washington.

Ruthenia Cornett Bentley remained active in the community and was well known throughout Knott County. She continued to live in the family home on Big Branch until her death on September 8, 1967. She was buried at the Cornett Family Cemetery on Big Branch, near Hindman, KY. Helen Cornett Downing

MAUDE LEE (LAWSON) and WILLIAM DENNIS CORNETT William Dennis Cornett (4/8/1909—7/17/1988) was born April 8, 1909 on Big Branch,

near Hindman, the son of Ruthenia Smith and Jeptha Cornett.

In 1924, he took a job with Knott Coal Company at Anco. He also served with his brother, Watson, as a deputy sheriff during the early 1930's.

In 1931, Dennis met Maude Lee Lawson (8/26/1914-10/12/1989), who was born August 26, 1914 in Lee County to Rebecca Ann Freeman (2/1/1892-2/12/1939) and Robert Bradley Lawson (9/3/1883 -8/27/1922). Rebecca and Robert had three daughters: Gladys Mae (2/9/1911-5/4/1981); Maude Lee(8/26/1914-10/12/1989); and Viola (5/7/1916-3/2/1973) and three sons who died at birth. After Robert died in 1922, Rebecca married Arch Miller and moved her family to Knott County.

Dennis and Maude were married May 14, 1932 and lived on the 40 acres of land his father left him on Big Branch. Their first child, Irene, was born there on April 3, 1933. They moved to the coal camp at Anco where their second child, Helen, was born on April 19, 1935. Dennis was a member of the Vicco Masonic Lodge during most of his adult life.

In the late 1940's, the family moved to Red Oak, near Sassafras. In December 1952, Dennis left Knott Coal Company and moved to Louisville. They bought a house here, the family joined the Yorktown Baptist Church, and Dennis found a job with International Harvester, where he worked until he retired in 1972.

Dennis passed away on July 17, 1988 from black lung. Maude passed away 18 months later on October 12, 1989 from complications of diabetes and multiple strokes. They were buried in Evergreen Cemetery in Louisville.

Irene Cornett Stidham was born April 3, 1933 on Big Branch, near Hindman, the first child of Maude Lee Lawson and William Dennis Cornett.

She attended Yellow Creek Grade School and Carr Creek High School, where she graduated on May 7, 1952. She left Knott County to attend Spencerian Business School in Louisville. The family joined her there in December 1952.

In 1954, Irene met Herbert Stidham who was born June 8, 1934 in Vicco, the son of Mary Elizabeth Deaton (4/15/1895-5/14/1981) and Floyd Delano Stidham (4/29/1886-12/12/1965).

Irene and Herb were married April 1, 1955 in Louisville. She worked until 1957 when they adopted Shirley Ann, born December 13, 1955. In December 1958, they adopted Sandra Gaye, born July 12, 1957. After several years, Susan Darlene was born on April 26, 1960. In 1961 Irene went to work for the Creasey Company and they bought their home. On June 4, 1965, their second child, Stephanie Lynn was born.

In 1978, Irene and Herb were divorced. Herb died October 30, 1981 and was buried in Evergreen Cemetery. Irene continued to work for the Creasey Company until December 1985, when the company was sold and closed. She worked for the state of Kentucky for a while and then for the Presbyterian Church (USA). Shirley Ann has two children: Jeffrey Scott Donnelly, born July 21, 1975, and Jennifer Lynn Donnelly, born July 14, 1977.

Helen Cornett Downing was born at Anco, April 19, 1935, the second child of Maude Lee Lawson and William Dennis Cornett. She attended Yellow Creek Grade School

and Carr Creek High School until the family left in December 1952.

On November 23, 1954, Helen found a job with General Electric. On January 25, 1955, she met Wayne Marrs Downing, who was born June 20, 1931 in Flippin, KY to Lilly Gurvis Johnson and Benny Estelle Downing.

Helen and Wayne were married July 21, 1962 and never had children. They both worked at G.E. until their early retirement; Wayne on September 30, 1987 and Helen on June 1, 1989. *Irene C. Stidham*

ADA COLLINS and WOODROW WILSON CORNETT Woodrow (Wilson) Cornett was born May 7, 1919 to Nathanial Green and Lucinda Cornett. Wilson was the oldest child, having one sister and 2 brothers, four half sisters and 2 half brothers. He grew up in Flax Patch in Knott County, and started working at age twelve to help his widowed mother support their family.

Ada Collins Cornett, was born on January 27, 1923 to John D. and Lucinda Collins in Knott County. She grew up in Irishman and Smithsboro, Kentucky. Ada had three sisters and eight brothers.

In 1939 Wilson met Ada through friends and they met again at a community box supper. He bought her box suppers that night and he often told the story of how he fell in love with her that night not only for good cooking but most for her beautiful heart. On May 5, 1941 they were married.

Ada gave birth to their first born son, Woodrow Dewain Cornett. During World War II, Wilson was drafted and traveled to France and Belgium. He was always so proud to have fought for his country and he told stories of those days many times and of the friends he made as well as the ones he lost.

Ada gave birth to three daughters, Wilma Lou, Peggy Sue and Wanda Gayle. Together she and Wilson raised their family in a strong Christian home and built their life on the values they so believed in devoutly.

Their four children blessed them with eight grandchildren, Dee, Woody, Kim, Angela, Tim, Robbie, Brock and Bryan. They are all young adults now and the pride of this family.

Her mother, Juanita Mae, was born 29 June 1938, in Indiana. She was a housewife.

Her father, Carlos, was born 28 February 1936, at Amburgey, Kentucky. He was a coal miner. Her parents met in Indiana. They got married on 23 March 1957. After their marriage they moved to Knott County.

Doris Marie has five brothers and six sisters. Her brothers are: 1. Darrell, born 15 December 1957; 2. Carl, born 19 January 1959; 3. David, born 13 October 1961; 4. John, born 24 October 1965; 5. Bruce, born 24 February 1969

MALISSA (COMBS) and BILL CORNETT Bi (b. July 2, 1890), son of Robin (b. March 3, 1857), son of Nathaniel Woleary (b. April 2, 1811), son of William (b. 1761), married Malissa Combs (b. July 16, 1896). Maliss was the daughter of Silas and Sylvia Ison Combs. She wa born at Uz, Letcher County, but grew up in Knott Count at Cow Town. When Bill and Malissa wanted to ge married, her parents objected and sent her to school i Whitesburg, Letcher County—so Bill ups and goes to ge her, takes her to Hazard, Perry County, and puts on the marriage application that they had parental permission.

During the depression, times were hard, but "moonshine" flowed freely. Everyone and his brother were making it to survive. In dark nights water was carried to keep the "worm" cool to condense the whiskey. Wher word got around that the "Revenue" men were snooping everyone hid their stills in leaves in thickets in the mountains—most of the time on someone else's property to play it safe.

When Roosevelt became President and started the NYC and WPA, Knott Countians got work and survived a little better. The amount of "moonshine" was decreased a little bit.

Bill was in the army during World War I, but during World War II, he was a defense worker at Delco Products. Dayton, Ohio. After the war, he became interested in politics and ran for the office of State Representative. He was elected to three terms and was serving at the time of his death.

To Bill and Malissa were born thirteen children. Ten of these lived to adulthood. Eight of these children became educators. These children were Mildred (m. Pardee Combs and Hagan Risner), Coney (m. Jewell Sutton), Lola Faye (otherwise known as Kiser—m. Fred Jones), Grace (m. Homer Amburgey), Lake (m. Warren Cooper), Scott (m. Geneva Smith), Brode (m Jeanetta Smith,) Mabel (m. Harry Smith), Madge (m. John Mayo), Bernie (m. Joann Kreger).

From the time that Bill was a child he was known as a banjo player and dancer. If any musical program came to town, he could be found playing music with them. He could play the banjo, fiddle, guitar, harmonica (harp) — all by ear without reading music.

Bill died playing his banjo in a Frankfort restaurant while there as a member of the state legislature on January of the story at this point and said, "this handsome young man left his friends on the porch, came out and introduced himself, helped me from the horse, and carried the corn into the mill to be ground into meal. After the corn was ground, he carried the meal out and loaded it on the horse for me." By this time, the young lady had decided Aster was a very nice young man. Needless to say, Aster married this young school teacher. Polly Ann Morgan, the daughter of Orlena (Combs) and Robert "Rob" Morgan of Emmalena, Kentucky, married Aster on 14 April 1920. Polly Ann traded a teaching career for marriage.

Aster left the mines shortly after marriage and after a short time as manager of a small country store, he purchased a farm and moved to Montgomery Creek to raise his family. A few years later he decided his children could get a better education if he lived in or near Hindman. He bought land, built a house and moved to just below Hindman in 1932. This area was later to become known as Cow Town. He kept the farm on Montgomery and continued to farm and buy and sell livestock until 1937.

In 1937 Aster got an opportunity to trade the farm on Montgomery for a farm in Indiana. He went to Indiana, liked what he saw, and traded on the spot. He came back to Knott County and in March 1937, he moved his family to Indiana. Aster was a successful farmer, a respected member of the community and a good husband and father. He developed an excellent herd of Hereford cattle and continued to farm until he retired.

Aster and Polly Ann have four living children: Carter; Robert C.; Elaine and John Paul still living in Ripley County, Indiana. Aster died 5 November 1967. Polly Ann continued to live on the home farm until her death on 2 February 1979. Robert C. Everage

DOROTHY (CORNETT) BUNDY and JOHN EVERAGE John Everage, born 12 October 1925 in Knott County, was one of seven sons and two daughters born to Maggie (Perkins) and Balis Everage of Tina, Kentucky. On 7 December 1946 John married Dorothy (Cornett) Bundy, the widow of S. Sgt. Joe Bundy.

After serving in World War II with the Medical Corps, U.S. Marines, John attended the Louisville School of Mortuary and graduated with the highest honors in his class. Returning to Knott County, John founded the Everage-Watts Funeral Home in 1952. In 1954 he established the Hindman Funeral Home, and with Orbin "Sweet" Childers, established the Hindman Monument Company in 1965. He was Knott County Coroner from 1954-1961, a member of the American Legion, Past Master of the Hindman Masonic Lodge #689, a member of the National Funeral Directors Association, and the Kentucky Funeral Directors Association, and the Kentucky Funeral Directors Burial Association.

Dorothy, born 18 May 1917, was the first of twelve children born to Maggie (Combs) and Rev. Neil Cornett. A graduate of the University of Kentucky, she taught school in Perry and Knott County school systems for 30 years. She was a member of the Montgomery Baptist Church and Choir, and belonged to the Eastern Star, to the Kentucky Education Association and to the National Education Association.

In June 1975 John retired from the Hindman Funeral Home due to a heart related disability. He died at his home 24 August 1977 from an accidental gunshot wound. Dorothy died of heart failure at the Appalachian Regional Hospital in Hazard, Kentucky on 2 August 1979.

By hard work and determination, John and Dorothy Everage became respected leaders and business operators who influenced and helped shape Knott County. John was a skillful embalmer and funeral director who expressed concern for the families he served. Externally, he was a big, rugged man with a sense of humor. Inwardly he had a compassionate servant's heart, that performed deeds of goodness and generosity without needing man's approval or praise. He was loved and respected by his family, his peers and the community at large. Dorothy was a devoted wife to John, and by her example she taught her daughters the importance of family. In her dealings with others, Dorothy was dependable, honest, and kind. In their personal, professional and business conduct, they truly touched the lives of thousands and were loved by multitudes. SYLVIA (GRIGSBY) and JOSEPH EVERAGE

Joseph Everage, born 1790, probably in North Carolina, was the son of Abner Everage. Abner lived in North Carolina where he purportedly enlisted in the Revolutionary War from which he never returned. His widow lived with her four children a few years thereafter. Upon enduring much trouble, hardship and heartache, she deserted her family. It is written that while her two sons, Joseph and Solomon, were away from the home, she tied her three daughters, Nellie, Polly Ann and Mary to the bed posts, and hastily departed. The children were cared for by the neighbors until they were old enough to work for themselves.

Solomon, born 1784, married Catherine Ison, born 1795 and they settled in Rowan County, Kentucky. Nellie married Ben Johnson of Raleigh, North Carolina. Polly Ann married Robert Brashears and according to May Stone, they were one of the first settlers on Leatherwood Creek in Perry County. Mary, born 1772, married William Cornett in Sullivan County, Tennessee.

Joseph supposedly came to Hindman with his sister, Mary (Everage) and William Cornett, where he settled on Betty's Troublesome of Carr Fork. The tradition of the family has Joseph married to Sylvia Grigsby, but one researcher suggests he married Sylvania Hammonds. The early Clay marriages list Joel Eversole married on 11 December 1817 to Sylvia Grigsby. "Silviny" Everage, born 1788 North Carolina, died June 1860 with a fever.

Children of Joseph and Sylvia are: (1) Rachel Everage, born 1810, married David Calhoun; (2) Mary Everage, born 1818, married 18 February 1836 to Joshua Mullins, born 1815 in Virginia and (3) Solomon, born April 1822, married first on 5 July 1845 to Elizabeth Turner, born 1825, daughter of Rachel and William Turner, second to Cordelia Tignor; (4) Benjamin, born 7 February 1824, married 5 July 1855 in Letcher County, to Elizabeth Amburgey, born September 1833 in Virginia; (5) Nicholas Everage, born 1825, married Susannah Watts, born 1834, daughter of Sarah (Fields) and Enoch Watts (6) John Everage, born 1827, married 22 November 1849 Letcher County, to Sarah A. Musick, born 1832, daughter of Sige Musick of Beaver; (7) Thomas Everage, born 1832, married Rachel Johnson, daughter of Nellie and Ben Johnson.

Known children of Solomon and Catherine are: (1) John; (2) Sampson, born 1829, married Mary Kelley; (3) Synthia, born 1830; (4) Elisha, born 1834; (5) Polly, born 1835; (6) Abner, born 1837; (7) Granville, born 1840 and (8) Elizabeth, born 1842.

Solomon, husband of Elizabeth Turner and of Hindman Settlement School fame, sold his entire estate in May 1867 for \$1.00 to his son Joel Everage (Letcher Deed Book 4, page 216). On 28 February 1889 Solomon married a second time to Cordelia Tignor, born May 1858.

Solomon Everage's children were: (1) William, born March 1846, married Amelia Walker, born January 1849, they lived on Montgomery Creek; (2) Rachel "Catty," born 1846, married Austin "Aut" Ritchie; (3) Nicholas "Nick," born March 1847, married Easter Howard, born July 1874; (4) Silvania Everage, born 1849, married Gabe Ritchie; (5) Joel Everage, born 1851, married 31 October 1875 to Sarah Tate; (6) Sarah "Sally," born April 1854, married 1876 in Letcher County to George Hays, born May 1849; (7) Margaret, born 1856, married 1873 to Lewis "Red-Headed" Hays, born 1851, died 1917; (8) Jenny, born December 1860, married William "Bud" Newland; (9) Elizabeth, born 1862, married 21 September 1882 in Letcher County to Jackson Madden and (10) Amelia and/or Ann, born 1867, married Hezekiah Cody. SUSAN (WATTS) and NICHOLAS EVERAGE Nicholas Everage was born in 1827 on Irishman Creek and died on Trace Fork of Irishman in June 1906. Susan Watts Everage was born on Irishman in 1834 and died at home in 1910. They both are buried in the Franklin Cemetery at Amburgey, Ky.

Nicholas was the son of Joseph Everage born 1790 and Sylvannia Grigsby born 1794. Joseph's parents were Abner Everage and his mother's name was probably Mary. Abner joined the Revolutionary War from North Carolina and never came home.

Nicholas' father Joseph was a hero of the War of 1812. He carried a wounded soldier from Detroit all the way to Knott Co., on Beaver Creek. Nicholas' brother Solomon Everage (Everidge) has been called "the grandaddy of Troublesome". He was the man that walked 22 miles to Hazard to get Katherine Pettit and May Stone

to come to Hindman and start a school. As a result of this Hindman Settlement School was started.

Susan was the daughter of Enoch Watts from Ky. and Sally Fields from Virginia. Enoch's father was George Washington Watts. Nicholas and Susan had no or very little education. They were farmers by trade. They raised their own food and built their own home. They raised a large family and all turned out well.

The children of Nicholas and Susan were: 1. Matilda Everage born 6-10-1852 married Andy Combs (Curly) 2. Enoch born 6-10-1858 died 7-8-1923. married 12-23-1877 to Martha Caudill born 1861 and died 4-1-1918. 3. Sarah born 1860 died 1933 married 1879 to Napoleon Mullins born 1855. 4. CLARA BELLE (PARKS) and THEEAPHOLIS GARRET EVERAGE T.G. (Theeapholis Garret) "Mose" Everage, son of William "Will" and Roxanne Mullins Everage, was born February 16, 1878, in Knott County, Kentucky, one of ten children. He was a well-known teacher in Knott County, especially in the Irishman Creek area, even teaching during World War II with his granddaughter. He farmed too.

Clara Belle Parks was born March 10, 1883, the daughter of Frelin and Sally Eads (Hall) Parks. It is not known if she was born in Kentucky or Virginia. She was one of nine children. They were married August 16, 1902.

T. G. was well liked by all his friends and neighbors. Most brought their math problems to him to figure out, such as how many bushels of corn a sled would hold or how many tons of coal a bin would hold. He was a great talker. In fact he was hit by a car once while standing in the middle of a highway talking to friends after church. He loved playing jokes, especially on his cousin, Ben Jock. He once got Ben to stick his hand in a groundhog hole, telling him there was a rabbit in there. He got along well with Mrs. Lloyd of Caney, Kentucky.

T. G. had four brothers: John was born August 16, 1875, and died May 29, 1943; Vollie was born January 29, 1886, and died May 30, 1928; Jasper (Jake) (no dates); Spencer was born June 22, 1892, and died August 20, 1972. He had four sisters: Lucinda Owens was born August 8, 1880 and died January 20, 1974; Matilda Smith was born April 8, 1883, and died September 20, 1973; Rachel Davidson was born December 21, 1888, and died November 23, 1956; Rhoda Cornett (no dates); Mary Smith Cornett was born March 15, 1901, and died June 12, 1965.

Clara was a hard worker both in the house and on the farm. During the winter she quilted and sewed for her children. She also loved to read.

Clara had three brothers: Alexander (no dates); Leeander was born January 1, 1874, and died April 9, 1952; Johnny (no dates). She had five sisters: Lucinda Everage (no dates); Celia Adams was born February 1, 1878 and died June 23, 1963; Laura Calton was born in 1875, and died in 1961; Julia Craft, Seals, Sexton (no dates); Eliza Collins was born December 19, 1868, and died August 23, 1933.

T. G. and Clara Belle had eleven children: Cora Amburgey was born July 15, 1903, and died December 28, 1985; Nora Amburgey was born February 6, 1908 and died December 20, 1993; Kermit was born March 18, 1910, and died March 5, 1992, (he made Who's Who in American Educators); Sophie Gibson was born April 23, 1912, and died August 1, 1958; Ruby Dixon was born August 31, 1919; Everett was born June 24, 1924; Ruth Vanover was born November 25, 1926; John Buford, Nonnie, Docie, and Ollie died young (no dates). Four of T. G. and Clara Belle's children were teachers as well as six grandchildren.

T. G. passed away on November 19, 1962, and Clara Belle passed away July 16, 1974. Ruby (Everage) Dixon

EMILY (JONES) and MOSE EVERIDGE Solomon Everidge, or "Sol" as he was commonly called, was Mose Everidge's grandfather. "Sol" had two sons, Lewis and Nick. Nick married a Smith and they were the parents of Mose, born 12 July 1868. Mose was raised around Hindman where he was a farmer and worked in the log woods.

Russell H. Jones and his family were from Wise, Virginia and walked over the mountain carrying their belongings. They settled somewhere in the Whitesburg area. Russell was born in 1844 and died in 1890. He was a 2nd Lieutenant, 130th Regiment, 28th Brigade 5th Division, Virginia Militia. His daughter, Emily, one of five children, was born 26 January 1870. She met and married Mose Everidge. Most of their life was spent near or in Hindman.

Mose and Emily had eleven children: (1) Grover Cleveland; (2) Albia; (3) Ina; (4) Samp; (5) Nick; (6) Evelyn; (7) Vina; (8) Rhena; (9) Joe; (10) Cecil and (11) Jennie. Joe was the baby.

Jennie, known as "Jennie Peg", worked at the old Bailey Hotel and later had a restaurant of her own.

Cecil, the story goes, was hoeing corn. He suddenly threw down his hoe and said, "This isn't for me. I'm going to the army." He was stationed in Panama and later served in France. He served his country for around six years.

Cecil met Hazel Drochelman from Evansville, Indiana at Camp Taylor where he was stationed with her brother, Henry. He and Hazel were married in either 1918 or 1919 and lived in Evansville. They had four boys: (1) Edwin, born 24 May 1920; (2) Walter, born 11 April 1922; (3) Cecil, Jr., born 11 June 1925 and (4) George, born 21 March 1927.

Cecil worked in a furniture factory and as a section hand with the L & N Railroad. Later he worked for C & O Railroad

Hazel died 29 September 1929. Cecil soon brought the boys to Kentucky to Mose and Emily. It was here that Cecil, Jr., died 11 November 1930. Cecil, Sr. returned to Evansville to collect insurance and he died on 24 December 1930. Mose and Emily kept the boys as their own. Emily was almost 61 years of age. Mose died 2 February 1933. Joe was still at home. Times were hard. Emily had a total of \$12.00 per month. She taught the boys to do all types of work. Edwin stayed in the Hindman Settlement School one year, then attended Georgetown College and taught school. He married Edna Amburgey and they had

two children, Donald Ray, born 2 February 1941, died 18 August 1941 and Bobby Phillip, born 14 February 1943. Edwin and Edna were divorced in 1943. Walter graduated from Hindman High School and stayed on campus one year.

Edwin, Walter and George worked in the shipyard in Newport News, Virginia for some time.

During World War II, Emily had four stars in her window: Joe was in the army; Edwin, the marines; Walter, the air force and George was in the navy. Emily was living with Jennie at this time.

When the war ended, Edwin returned to college at the University of Kentucky, where he met and married Marie Watson. Edwin became an elementary school principal and Marie was an elementary supervisor. They had no children.

Walter attended UK and studied accounting. He later taught ball-room dancing and managed a hotel.

George went with the Merchant Marines. He married Edna Conley, postmistress at Garrett. For a time he worked as postal clerk. They had no children.

Emily Everidge died 4 October 1959 while still living with Jennie.

Bobby Phillip Everidge, Sr., son of Edwin, married Judy Stewart and they had one son, Bobby Phillip Everidge, Jr., born 4 May 1975. He is Mose and Emily's great great grandchild. *Ruby E. Dixon*

LOUISA (MULLINS) and NICK FIELDS Nick Fields was born April 24, 1894, son of Frank and Polly Everage Fields. Nick was one of 10 children born to the family that lived up on the Trace Fork of Irishman in Knott Co. Ky. Nick left the farm fields of his father and went to work for the Knott Coal Co. He worked underground for 32 years and was proud of the fact that he never had an accident, "not so much as lost a fingernail." In 1916, he married Louisa Mullins, daughter of Jasper and Elizabeth Mullins. They were married by the Reverend Willie Francis.

Nick and Louisa had nine children together. Their eldest child, Carlus, died shortly after his first birthday. Nick and Louisa took great pride in their family and taught them to be honest and hardworking. They believed in the tenets of the Old Regular Baptist Church and reared their children accordingly.

Nick eventually died from the Black Lung disease he had contracted from his many years in the mines. He was 72 years old. Louisa died of a stroke at the age of 82. They left behind them eight children, 17 grandchildren and numerous great-grandchildren who carry on their strong belief in marriage and family. At the time of Nick's death, he and Louisa had been married 50 years.

John M., the eldest surviving son, is retired from Illinois Central Railroad Co., and lives in Ill. with his wife Opal (Dixon). He graduated from Carr Creek High School and Caney Jr. College. Before working with the railroad, John M. taught briefly at Trace Fork school. He was drafted into the Army during World War II, and served time in the South Pacific. He and Opal have three children, Dwayne, Jo Ann and Michael. All are graduates of Southern Illinois University.

Ada B. married Everett Calhoun. She was a housewife, her husband a well-known carpenter in Knott County. They had no children. Both have suffered strokes and are currently in a nursing home in Whitesburg, Ky.

Eloise was born in Van Lear, Ky. on Aug. 23, 1923. She is the daughter of the late James and Annie Phelps Hall. Eloise graduated from Van Lear High School and later received her training as a cosmetologist from Mayo Vocational School in Paintsville.

World War II interrupted Claude's college education and he entered the army shortly before the bombing of Pearl Harbor.

Claude served in the 701st Destroyer Batallion-First Armored Tank Division in North Africa where he was run over by a jeep and wounded by enemy fire. He was later

awarded the Purple Heart.

Claude and Eloise were able to maintain their relationship by writing letters to one another. Within days of Claude's return to the United States, he and Eloise were married on April 27, 1944.

Claude remained in the army for another year and he and Eloise became the parents of a daughter, Cathy Ann, born on April 6, 1945. Upon discharge, Claude went to work as a coal miner in Wayland, Ky.

Alice Lloyd, the founder of Caney Junior College, had learned that Claude had been discharged from the army. She sent word that she would like to see Claude, and she made him an offer that would change the course of the rest of his life.

Mrs. Lloyd needed someone to re-open the Caney Cottage in Lexington. This was a house that Caney College maintained for students who wanted to further their education at the University of Kentucky. The cottage had been closed during the war and someone was needed to oversee repairs, and get the house ready for students.

Claude and his family moved to Lexington and he was able to graduate from U.K. in the spring of 1946.

Claude began his teaching career in his hometown of Wayland, Ky. He later taught English and coached the boys basketball team at Garrett High School. The basketball team was so successful that they were regional champions and attended the State Tournament in 1949.

After receiving a Masters degree from U.K. in 1950, Claude was then offered the job as the principal of Hindman High School in Knott County. Claude held this position from 1950 till 1963.

Harrison Samuel Francis had a grocery store also at Smithsboro, Kentucky; 1/4 mile from the Post Office. We moved to Milan, Indiana in 1945, on a 62 acre farm. We moved to Indiana because Daddy didn't want the three sons who were coming home after World War II had ended to have to work in the mines, as he had done earlier for many years. Harrison raised corn, soy beans, and tomatoes for a local canning factory. Harrison and Ranie belonged to the Old Regular Baptist Church. Coy, Hastel, and Hubert (Huck) played basketball for Carr Creek High School. Harrison Samuel, Jr. played basketball at Milan High School in Indiana. *Donna M. (Francis) Disney*

After time went by he built a home at Carr Creek, Kentucky, and with six children and a beautiful wife, spent several happy years with family, friends, and relatives.

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

The following letter was sent to James Taylor Adams from Bernice Cundiff; Shelby Street, rankfort, Kentucky; the letter was dated 10 December 1931; and was from A. D. Hiller, Assistant o Administrator, Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C.

'Reference is made to your letter in which your request further information in regard to John Cundiff, of Hardin County, Kentucky, whose record was furnished you on January 28, 1930.

The papers in Revolutionary War pension claim W. 8647, based upon his military service in that war, have been carefully re-examined in you behalf and his full record follows:

John Cundiff was born January 14, 1757, place not stated.

While residing in Bedford County, Virginia, he served three months in Captain Joshua Early's Company, Colonel Charles Lynch's Virginia Regiment; about a year later, he served three months in Captain Alexander Cummins' Company, Colonel Tucker's Virginia Regiment and was in a skirmish at Pointy Fork (?), on the James River, and was at the surrender of Cornwallis. There are no definite dates of either service given. It also stated that he had short tours guarding prisoners, no further details given.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 19, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Hardin County, Kentucky.

He died September 18, 1837.

The soldier married May 15, 1778, in Bedford County, Virginia, Sally, her maiden name not

Soldier's widow, Sally, was allowed pension on her application executed December 28, 1838, stated. at which time she was a resident of Hardin County, Kentucky, and aged eighty years.

As the patrol rode toward Whitesburg, the men became thirsty and stopped at a spring just past 5th Sgt. Cornett's house to fill their canteens. But the Brown boys had arrived at that location first and were waiting in ambush. While the patrol attended to satisfying their thirst, the Brown boys yelled out for release of Ben or they would open fire. John replied to his cousins that he could not do so and if they tried anything, their father, his uncle would be shot. Suddenly Ben yelled out to his boys not to surrender and spurred his horse in a desperate effort to escape. His efforts were met with a fury of bullets, resulting in Ben being mortally wounded. By only conjecture, it is assumed that 5th Sgt. John Cornett gave permission for his cousins to take Ben to the nearest house (his own), or at least turned a blind eye to the

bereaved boys to enable them to tend to their stricken father. Family legend has it that J. B. stated he never fired a shot and tried to stop the men from shooting. He then ordered the Company (the patrol outnumbered the Browns so it stands to reason that this is a fairly accurate account) back to Whitesburg, thereby enabling the Browns to come out of the woods and procure their father. In any event, the boys took their dying father to Joseph and Sally's cabin (John's parents) where he died on the floor in front of their fireplace. The aftermath of the shooting was felt for generations. The Brown's blamed the Cornett's for the killing of Ben and the Cornett's blamed the Brown's for the ambush and partially crippling of John. After the war, John returned to Dry Fork, living in the tense atmosphere of the war in which brother was fighting brother. He is buried at the Cornett-Brown-Caudill Cemetery, below the mouth of Dry Fork. Ironically, one of his cousins that participated in the incident on Dry Fork, Doc Brown, is buried within fifty feet of John.

Those dreaded telegrams from the War Department said too much, yet told too little. Their "Regrets" seem impersonal, formal and trivial compared to the feelings of the feeling of the those who read them. The words "killed in action" always bring to mind agonizing concerns, - How did my loved one really die? Did he suffer long and painfully?

Are They giving me some official whitewash?

Sometimes it's best not to know and the War Department's apparent cruelty is kindness. At other times knowing the full truth can be a comforting solace. I know, by personal experience that this is one of the comforting times. As a combat soldier I witnessed enough to make me suffer more keenly knowing firsthand how cruel death Supplied to the supplied to th can be.

When the shooting stopped in Europe I was in Liege, Belgium at a convalescent hospital. When the bells started ringing I was downtown at a hotel that had been taken over for use by Allied servicemen, I rushed out and joined the wildly celebrating crowd, till I recalled my brother's death months before. My mom had quoted the dreaded official telegram to me, in a handwritten V-

mail letter trying to comfort me for my grief over the news of my beloved kid brother Donnie's death. Her kindly letter brought shock and torment - I hadn't heard till then. 450.11

I took refuge in a recessed doorway, trying not to cry, when another GI popped in and stood with tears running down his cheeks. For some unknown reason we stood shoulder-to-shoulder, bawling. It hurt really badly, losing my kid brother was made worse by the fact that my outfit had been attached later to Donnie's 78th (Lightning) Division, and I had kept trying to find out if he had suffered at the end. All I knew was that he'd received a field commission as a 2nd Lt. and had been killed in action eleven days later - and was posthumously awarded the Silver Star.

Fate pointed it's fickle finger at me, and so one day a couple months earlier I rousted 16 German soldiers out of a cellar with my B.A.R. We'd been in the same house for an hour, taking our small arms apart and cleaning them. I went to look in the cellar for wine when a pistol shot went off a foot away. I slammed the door, ran to the table and had my BAR assembled in seconds.

(2) Cynthia Ann, born March 27, 1962, was married December 20, 1985, to Shannon Bradley Lewis of South Shore, Kentucky. They are the parents of Bradley Daniel, born May 2, 1990. (3) Karen Sue, born November 24, 1963. 4) Lisa Lynn, born January 7, 1966.

In 1966, the Cornetts moved to Greenup, Kentucky, where Bud worked for Mocabee's Department Store. Their youngest child, Jimmy Bulan was born May 12. 1968. He was married October 1, 1991, to Dala Jo McDaniel, of Evansville, Indiana. Bud and Pam have resided in the same home in Greenup for over 25 years. Bud currently works at the Martins store in Vanceburg, Kentucky.

They had two children. After moving to Knott County, they had Crafton and Alix. Crafton was born 25 January 1974 and Alix was born 9 February 1976. Amanda

EWEL B. CORNETT, SR. The purpose of this writing is to provide for my two sons and their families as much information as possible on the four branches of my family. It is hoped that at some time in the future this brief and limited history will be of special interest to at least some of them. The families to be reviewed are as follows:

- 1. Cornett-our family name.
- 2. Brashear- My paternal grandmother's family
- 3. Amburgey- My mother's family name
- 4. Adams- My maternal grandmother's family

These families were all early settlers of the Cumberland Mountain area of Eastern Kentucky in what

is now known as Breathitt, Owsley, Perry, Knott, Leslie and Letcher Counties. They settled in this area in the following order:



Adeline (Brashear) Cornett

William Cornett-In 1797 settled on the North Fork of the Kentucky River at the mouth of Bull Creek

James Brashear-In about 1820 came from Tennessee and settled near what is now known as Fusonia, Kentucky. Ambrose Amburgey-In about 1827 settled on Carr

Adams-We have very little information on our Adams forefathers. According to "Perry County Kentucky-A History", John, Rachel and Spencer Adams were charter members of the Indian Bottom Baptist Church that was organized in 1820 in Letcher County. They settled in the area some years before that.

First we will review the history of the founding of Kentucky as covered in the book entitled "Perry County Kentucky-A History" by the Hazard Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

1772- The State of Virginia established the "Kentucky Territory" and made it a part of Fincastle County. This included all of what is now the State of Kentucky.

1776-Fincastle County was subdivided and Kentucky County Virginia was established which encompassed the area known as Perry, Knott, Letcher, Leslie, Breathitt and Owsley Counties and will hereafter be referred to as "this area."

1780-Virginia set aside all land in Kentucky County for soldiers who served in the Revolutionary War. Also, Kentucky was divided into three counties, Jefferson, Fayette and Lincoln. This placed this area in Fayette County, Virginia.

1785-Fayette County divided and this area became part of Bourbon County, Virginia.

1792-Kentucky became a state and from this date this area became a part of different counties as boundary changes were made as follows: Clark(1793), Montgomery(1796), Floyd(1799), and Clay(1806).

1820-This area became Perry County. It was named in honor of Oliver Hazard Perry, a hero of the naval battle of Put-In-Bay on Lake Erie, in which a number of Kentuckians had fought as volunteers and helped win the War of 1812

1821-The town of Hazard was established.

During the next sixty-four years, Perry County was split and boundaries changed many times with the end result that five new counties were split off as follows: 1839-Breathitt County, 1842-Letcher County, 1843-Owsley County, 1878-Leslie County, 1884-Knott County. The attached sketch shows this area as it is today.

In the following pages each of the four branches of our family will be covered separately. Information on these families is very limited in most cases, especially the Adams branch about whom very little is known by this writer, for additional information on the Cornett group refer to "The Genealogy of William Cornett-1761-1836" by J.D. Cornett.

For the Brashear group refer to "The Brashear Story" by Back and Brashear.

For the Amburgey group refer to "Amburgey Ancestry in America" by Dorothy A. Griffith. Leo D. Cline

MARTHA LOUISE (COX) and GEORGE WASHINGTON CORNETT George Washington Cornett was born at Big Branch of Troublesome in Knott,

County, Kentucky, December 6, 1908. His parents were Samuel S. Cornett from Knott County and Rachel Hudson from Little Buckhorn.

George spent his early years on Big Branch where he attended elementary school until the fifth grade. He attended school at Caney from the fifth grade through one year of high school. At that time he went to Berea Normal School and completed a course of study that prepared him to teach. Superintendent Hiram Taylor hired him to teach at a one room school at Montgomery in Knott County, at the time George was seventeen years old.

George met Martha Louise Cox during a visit she made to Big Branch during a summer vacation. Martha was born July 26, 1914, in Morgan County, Kentucky. Her parents were William S. (Bum) Cox and Pauline Dyer, both of Morgan County. Martha attended elementary school and high school at West Liberty, Kentucky and took some college classes at Morehead. George and Martha were married January 7, 1933.

During the early part of his career and married life, George continued his education. He obtained his Bachelor's degree at Morehead in 1950 and his Master's degree at the University of Kentucky in 1962. After his first job at Montgomery, he taught various places until 1948 when he landed the job at Cordia High School, in Knott County. At Cordia High School George was mathematics teacher and basketball coach. Cordia was a very small community school and for many years had no gymnasium. George transported young men to the gymnasium at Hindman to practice. Although he was never able to win a District Championship, he had very few losing seasons. He was a very animated coach whose love of the game was infectious. His teams were well disciplined and he tried to teach the importance of being a team member to each participant. He stressed the fact that there is no "big I" in team, only a "little me", and although winning was important, it was also important how you played the game.

George was at Cordia High School until 1970. After leaving Cordia High School, he taught and coached basketball at Jenkins Independent in Kentucky for two years, retiring from teaching in 1973.

George and Martha had eight children: Lester Sparks (Sparky) Cornett, now deceased; Anna Jean Cornett Combs, residing at Clear Fork, in Knott County; Sammie Cornett Rader, residing at Pineville, Kentucky; Everett Price (E. P.) Cornett, residing at Big Branch, in Knott County; Richard Glen (Dickie) Cornett, residing at Paintsville, Kentucky; Paula Cornett Hayes, residing at Big Branch, in Knott County; Marie Jacqueline (Winkie) Cornett Everett, residing at Douglasville, Georgia; and Elva Curtis Cornett, residing at Douglasville, Georgia.

George and Martha are both very active members of the Big Branch Fellowship Chapel. They still live on Big Branch of Troublesome, in Knott County, where they started their life together.

RUTHENIA (SMITH) and JEPTHA CORNETT Jeptha Cornett (4/23/1875-3/7/1919), was the son of Joseph Cornett (3/7/1836-8/1/1917) and Susanna Caudill (3/6/1841-12/4/1899); and the grandson of Nathan W. Cornett (4/2/1811-1/12/1889) and Liddia Caudill. His $great-grand parents\ were\ William\ Cornett\ (born\ in\ Henrico$ County, VA in 1761) and second wife, Mary Everage.

Jeptha married Ruthenia Smith (7/6/1881-9/8/1967), daughter of Samuel Smith and Nancy Owens. They had eight children: Susie, Sylvania, Melvin James, Watson E., William Dennis, Henry Delmas, Gordon, and Orpha Cornett.

After Jep died, Ruthenia married Alex Bentley. They adopted a little girl named Dallie Bentley. Ruthenia Cornett Bentley died at home on September 8, 1967. Helen (Cornett) Downing, Irene C. Stidham

GOLDIA (SLONE) and JOHN CHRIS CORNETT John Chris was born August 6, 1910, in Indianapolis, Indiana. His father, Christopher C. Cornett, was in the United States Army and was stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison in Lawrence, Indiana. His mother was the former Minnie Jones. Christopher died when John Chris was a year old and Minnie returned to Knott County to live near her family. She married Marson Moore and they had eight children: Mason, Earl, DuRan, Dempsey, Rudolph, Anna B., Mattie and Janice. Marson and Minnie owned a small grocery store and operated the United States Post Office at Mallie.

Goldia was born at Pinetop to Farris and Mary Liz Slone on July 22, 1913. She grew up on a farm on Branhams Creek with fifteen brothers and sisters: Verlin, Ivan, Olis, Stanford, Joann, Dalna, Velma, Opal, Berta, Inez, Lola, Jean, Dallas, Johnie and Cornell.

Goldia attended the Branhams Creek school when she could be spared from the farm. John Chris went to the Mallie grade school, the Hindman Settlement School and finished high school at Caney under the watchful eyes of Alice Lloyd and June Buchanan. He attended Caney Junior College, Western State Teachers College in Bowling Green and Morehead State Teachers College, receiving an AB degree in 1935. He studied law at Cumberland Law College in Lebanon, Tennessee and received a degree from the University of Kentucky School of Law.

It took John Chris quite a few years to finish school because he often had to skip a term and work to earn money to cover his expenses. This he did by teaching in one-room schools in several Knott County communities, including Rock Fork, Lower Caney, Branhams Creek, Mallie, Puncheon and Clear Creek, for \$50 per month. He taught a total of twelve years.

John Chris and Goldia met while he was teaching at Branhams Creek. They were married December 8, 1932. In the first years of their marriage they moved from place to place as John Chris either taught or went to school. They finally settled in Mallie and had four children: two sons who died in infancy and twins, Earl McCoy and Elizabeth Ann.

Goldia cared for the children, ran the household, cultivated the gardens, taught Sunday school classes and raised money to build the Community Gospel Church at Mallie. When the children were grown, she became the proprietor of the Hindman Hotel and later of the Hindman Shoe Store as well.

John Chris began a long career of public service in 1937 when he was elected to represent Knott and Magoffin Counties in the State Legislature. He served in this capacity for two years; as County Judge of Knott County for four years; as Commonwealth Attorney for Knott and Floyd Counties for five years; as State Senator for Perry, Knott,

Floyd and Martin Counties for four years; and as Circuit Judge of Knott and Magoffin Counties for more than twenty-seven years. He was also a member of the Board of Trustees of Alice Lloyd College, the Methodist Church and the Masonic Lodge. He retired from public office in 1983 at the age of 73 but he continued to practice law and to work for Alice Lloyd College. Throughout his life he gave advice and assistance to countless numbers of relatives, friends and acquaintances, most of which is known only to the recipients.

Goldia died December 7, 1979. John Chris died June 3, 1993. Elizabeth Reed

SUSANNA (CAUDILL) and JOSEPH E. CORNETT Joseph E. Cornett (3/7/1836-8/1/1917) was one of the sons of Liddia Caudill and Nathan W. Cornett. Joseph met and married Susanna Caudill (3/6/1841-12/4/1899) and they had twelve children: Nathaniel Green, Watson, John, Samuel, Jeptha, Sara, Mary, Martha, Margaret, Sally, Jane, and Nancy Cornett. Joseph and Liddia owned several hundred acres of land on Big Branch, near Hindman, KY. Their children also became land owners near Hindman, KY.

Susanna died on December 4, 1899, at the age of 58, and Joseph never remarried. Joseph continued to live on Big Branch until his death on August 1, 1917. They were both buried in the Cornett Family Cemetery on Big Branch. *Helen (Cornett) Downing*

MABEL (RITCHIE) and LAWSON CORNETT Lawson Cornett enriched the lives of thousands of Knott County residents throughout his 40 years as an educator in the public schools. He began his career in the grade schools on Lotts Creek, Carr Creek, and Clear Creek. From 1947 through 1965 he taught math and science at Hindman High School where he sponsored a String Music Club and a Junior Conservation Club. He finished his career as the math teacher at Carr Creek High School.

Although career opportunities often sought to lure him else where, he was not content unless wrapped in the arms of his mother mountains. Perhaps he knew instinctively that the beautiful land of his forefather, Revolutionary War Veteran, William Cornett, could best evolve through the guidance of its native sons. Lawson was a good neighbor and leader in his community. As a man of God, he felt that religious instruction would benefit the children of his community. This prompted him to seek help from nearby missionaries to organize a Sunday School. This group met in school buildings and storehouses at first, but eventually grew into the Clear Creek Free Church. Lawson was a charter member, Sunday School teacher, and deacon until his passing in 1977. A lifelong outdoorsman, Lawson sought to encourage appreciation of nature among the young boys of his acquaintance. To this end he organized and led a local chapter of the Boy Scouts of America for many years.

Lawson Cornett was born at Sassafras; Knott Co., KY; June 19, 1904. He was the eleventh of twelve children born to Jasper and Rebecca (Hale) Cornett. Other children were Elhanon, Robert, William, John, Melvin, Sampson, Alcie, Dora, Maude, Mary, and Belle.

Lawson attended grade school at the mouth of Red Oak Branch, and graduated from St. Nicholas High School in 1922. (St. Nicholas stood near the present site of Carrs Fork Dam.) With family help and encouragement he earned Bachelor of Science degrees in biology and mathematics from the University of Kentucky.

In 1930 Lawson married Mabel Ritchie, the lovely and accomplished daughter of I.B. and Angeline (Owens) Ritchie of Cockrell's Trace Fork of Clear Creek; Knott Co., KY. Throughout her life Mabel was a meticulous homemaker, supportive wife and mother, an active member of her church and community, as well as an inspiration to all who knew her.

Lawson and Mabel were blessed with five children: Ronald Samuel, Ona Lou, Jasper Isaac (J.L.), Troy Lawson, and Timothy Eugene. Time marched on and fifteen grand-children joined the circle. To Ronald and his wife, Lois Jackson, were born: Warren, David, Ronald Brent, Rebecca, and Betsy. Ona Lou married 1st Garnard Martin and 2nd Ferd Renninger. Ona and Garnard had two sons: Phillip Martin and Chris Martin. J.I. and his wife, Sharon Ellis, had Shawn and Angie. Troy married Betty Mullins and added James Troy and Lea-Anne to the growing band. Tim's wife, Mary Kay Ritchie bore three sons: Gary Eugene, Eric, and Michael.

LYDIA (CAUDILL) and NATHANIEL WOLEARY CORNETT Nathaniel, born 2 April 1811, in what was then Clay County, Kentucky, was one of eight children of Mary (Everage) and William Cornett. William was an American Revolutionary War soldier, born in 1762 in Henrico County, Virginia. Nathaniel's brothers and sister were: (1) Robert Bustard; (2) Margaret; (3) Roger; (4) Nancy; (5) Rachel; (6) Samuel and (7) Joseph E.

Nathaniel married Lydia Caudill, born 19 July 1816, and settled at the mouth of Big Branch, which was then in Perry County. At that time Big Branch separated Letcher and Perry Counties. From 1839 to 1872 he received land grants for 900 acres in Letcher County and 2160 acres in Perry County. Some of the names of the signers and surveyors on the grants were: Solomon Everidge (Everage), Nathaniel Collins, John and William Walker, Campbell Pigman, George W. Calhoun, L.A. Duff, William V. Luck, Jackson Combs and J.G. Combs. Nathaniel signed his name with a mark (x).

Some of the forks on Big Branch were: Maple Gap, Beech Nut, Sweet Gum and Meadow. Perry County went up to Odgen Creek on the East Side of Troublesome Creek and Big Branch on the West side. At one time Nathaniel sold 500 acres to his brother, Joseph E., for \$150.00.

The process of obtaining land in the early nineteenth century was getting a surveyor to lay out the plot and then have other persons (usually some of the family) to sign it. Another method was to receive a grant from the governor. Governor Crittenden gave Nathaniel 50 acres.

of the house and coming out the other side, fishing and swimming in Troublesome Creek. She attended a oneroom school where teachers like I. B. Slone (father of Olive Conley) and Glenna Fugate (wife of Charlie Young) taught. Many times the teachers stayed the night at her parent's home. One recess activity was crossing Big Branch to get water from a spring coming out of rocks on the hill side, and another was hunting for chestnuts before blight killed the chestnut trees.

Her next school was a two-room one where Little George Cornett had all students out on the playground first thing in the morning taking exercise and learning how to breathe deeply. This woke all of them up, ready to start classes. Girls wore overalls to carry their marbles in the pockets and to climb trees. Dinner was in a four pound lard bucket, consisting of green beans and corn bread or buttermilk and cornbread. The love for her teachers led Lake to become a teacher for over forty years, starting in ramathematical statistician. At this time he is still there. Jo a two-room school on lower Mill Creek (wearing gum Ann graduated from UK and has been teaching in the boots while wading up the creek to reach the school house) Fayette Schools since 1966. and ending up at Morehead State University teaching mathematics. Lake was influenced by high school teachers like Pearl Combs and his wife Betty, Miss Standish, and "Prof. Smith"

Lake was a member of many organizations—Kappa Delta Pi (honor in education), Pi Mu Epsilon (honor in mathematics), Cardinal Key (honor in education), Who's Who in American Women. Personalities of the South, League of Women's Voters, Daughters of the American Revolution, French Honor Society, Morehead State University Woman's Club (president and treasurer), Rowan County Home Makers (president and treasurer). She got involved in politics like her dad. She was an election officer for many years before she became the first woman to be elected to Rowan County Board of Education. Later she was elected as City Council in Morehead.

Lake married Warren Harding Cooper, an all-American basketball player who in 1939 played the final game of the state tournament with Brooksville High School against Hindman High School. To Lake and Warren were born Frederick and Penelope. Frederick's children were Christopher, Philip, and Dakota. Penny's children were Dara Alderman, Chase Alderman and M'Shae Alderman.

Lake enjoyed returning to the Knott County Gingerbread festival each year in order to meet many of her long lost Knott County friends and relatives. Even though Lake was gone from Knott County for more than fifty years, she still spoke of home as Hindman. Lake (Cornett) Cooper

He was spoiled rotten by the older children, and every time his sister Grace mopped the dining room and kitchen he just had to have a drink of water.

Bernie was a 1955 graduate of Hindman High School, attended Caney Junior College for two years, and graduated from Morehead State Teachers College in 1959. While at Caney Bernie was selected to help count the money in many bags that came there after Ralph Edwards had Alice Lloyd on "This is your life." At Morehead Bernie had the misfortune to live with his sister (Lake Cooper) and to take mathematics classes which she taught. He had to do well or Lake threatened to tell "Mom" on him. Believe it or not, it made him a "believer" and also a good math student.

From the time Bernie could walk he was a good dancer. While at Morehead he won many dancing contests. Before he started dating his future wife, Jo Ann Crigger, he made sure that she was a good dancer also. Bernie and Jo Ann were married at Morehead, May 9, 1959, and moved to Maryland to work for the Bureau of Census. He worked at various places with the Bureau until 1963. 

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Green Morris, a native of Perry County, lived on his farm near Chavies and was considered wealthy man. He owned quite a bit of land and stock and was married to Elicia Polly from Virginia

Mr. Morris became a United States Marshall, and was sent to the Indian territory of Oklahoma to help keep law and order. While there he received a letter from his wife stating a feud was raging in Perry County, and that some of his friends were involved so he immediately went home and became active in the war.

Several years after the feud ended, Mr. Morris and his ten year old son were riding horseback to church one Sunday morning. They came to the home of Green Campbell, who was standing in the yard, and Morris stopped to invite him to go to church. Campbell drew a gun and shot Mr. Morris in the head and he fell from the norse dead.

Mr. Morris's son, who was riding behind him, was so frightened that he never got over the scene and when he became a man he was still bitter. He married Jessica Davidson, daughter of Ira Davidson, from Perry County and in later years they moved to London, Kentucky until his death.

THE CORNETT FAMILY

In the year 1740, or close to it, seven Cornett brothers came from England to America and settled in different parts of Kentucky.

William Cornett, son of John Cornett, was born in Henrico County, Virginia in 1761. He enlisted in the Revolutionary War, serving six months under Capt. Anthony Winston's company, and in the year 1780 he re-enlisted for six more months.

William was twice married, his first wife was Rhoda Gilliam and they had four children: John, Arch, Lucy and Elizabeth.

John married Rachel Smith and they had the following children: John, Arch, Russell, Rhoda, Mary, Elizabeth, Frankie, Nancy, Robert, and Harlan.

Lucy Cornett married Woolery Eversole and they had four children. Arch Cornett married Judy McDaniel and settled on Clover Branch in Perry County. They had eight children.

During Robin's lifetime there were plenty of trees and water in Troublesome Creek - so he prospered by logging and operating a water mill. The plenitude of available natural resources, in no way, assured an easy avenue of income, and his work was complicated by the only means of transportation at that time, i.e., wagon and team. Many travelers were put-up overnight and fed in Robin's home.

They are buried in the Cornett Family Cemetery at Cornettsville, Kentucky.

CORNELIA (AMBURGEY) and ROBERT SAMUEL CORNETT Robert Samuel Cornett Jr. was born 25 May 1878, died in 1962, the youngest of twelve children. He inherited property in Knott County from his father, Robert Samuel Cornett Sr., who inherited it from his father, John Cornett Sr.

John Cornett Sr. was born in Washington County, Virginia in 1794, died in 1871. He married Rachel (Smith) and moved to Clay County, Kentucky in 1818. He obtained a grant for five hundred and fifty acres of land in Knott County, including all of Sassafras Hollow and the bottom land along Carr Fork Creek. He built a log home on the east side of Sassafras Hollow and had ten children: Robert Samuel Sr., John Jr., Arch, Rusel, Rhoda, Mary. Elizabeth, Frankie, Nancy, and Harden.

Robert Samuel Cornett Sr. married Adeline (Brashear) and built a home on the west side of the hollow and had twelve children: Manton, Theopolis, who died in infancy, twins Jasper and Newton, Elizabeth, Rachel, Rhoda, Nancy, William Riley, John Dixon, Mary and Robert Samuel Jr.

Robert Samuel Cornett Jr., married Cornelia (Amburgey) 09 January 1900 and had nine children: Vida (Cornett) Combs, Mae (Cornett) Martin, Ewel B. Cornett, Miriam (Cornett) Blankenship, Carson H. Cornett, Hester (Cornett) Smallwood, Leo Dicy (Cornett) Cline, Zeda (Cornett) Watts, and Irene (Cornett) Lovelace. In 1912 he built a two story six room home to replace the old one and later added a kitchen and dining room wing with bedrooms upstairs.

He was told by census takers that he had the most modern farm house in the area. He had purchased a Delco Home Lighting System in 1927 and generated electricity for lights and appliances and piped water from a spring to the kitchen and bathroom.

He farmed the land by the sweat of his brow to provide for family, livestock, and to help others but encouraged his children to get an education and seek other employment.

He once was Magistrate in his district, was president of Peoples Bank in Hazard, Kentucky, was a veterinarian, set broken bones, owned a sawmill, pulled teeth with a homemade tool from his Blacksmith Shop and could make anything from horseshoes to farming tools. He was a Godfearing Christian, a man of his word, and promoted citizenship, obedience, and honesty.

He gave land for a Presbyterian Missionary Church, a Parsonage, and school in 1902, which became St. Nicholas High School in 1921. He boarded the transported teachers and kept many children so they could get an

education. Two of his oldest children were in the first graduating class of 1924 and went on to college. When coal mining developed, the church and school was moved to Vicco, Kentucky to become Vicco High School which is now consolidated into Dilce Combs High School at Jeff, Kentucky. The Presbyterian Church is still operating.

The Cornett Homesteaders are planted in the Cornett Hill Cemetery by the Little Dove Regular Baptist Church along with many of their offspring. The Robert S. Cornett Jr. Homestead is now maintained by the youngest daughter, Irene, and her husband, Mack Lovelace. Leo D. Cline

RHODA (GILLIAM), MARY (EVERAGE) and WILLIAM CORNETT William Cornett was born in Henrico County, VA in 1761, and was the son of John Cornett of Virginia. William left Virginia and settled in Perry County, KY and was the first known Cornett to inhabit the area. He and his first wife, Rhoda Gilliam, had four children: John, Arch, Lucy and Elizabeth Cornett.

After William's first wife died, he married Mary Everage and they had seven children: Robert Bustard, Roger, Nancy, Rachel, Samue 1, Nathan Woll, and Joseph Cornett. William died on November 26, 1836 and was buried in Perry County, KY. Some of his children settled in Knott County.

Nathan Woll Cornett (/2/1811-1/12/1889) was one of the sons of Mary Everage and William Cornett. Nathan Woll marred Liddia Caudill, daughter of Sara Adams and Steven Caudill, and settled in Knott County, KY. Liddia Caudill and Nathan Woll Cornett had ten children: Joseph E., Rachel, Sally, Mary, Nancy, Polly Ann, Easter, Roger, Benton, and Robin Cornett.

Joseph Cornett (3/17/1836-8/1/1917) was one of the sons of Liddia Caudill and Nathan Woll Cornett. Joseph met and married Susanna Caudill (3/6/1841-12/4/1899) and they had twelve children: Nathaniel Green, Watson, John, Samuel, Jeptha, Sara, Mary, Martha, Margaret, Sally, Jane, and Nancy Cornett. Joseph and Liddia owned several hundred acres of land on Big Branch, near Hindman, KY and most of their children also owned land near Hindman.

Susanna died December 4, 1899, at the age of 58, and Joseph never remarried. Joseph continued to live on Big Branch until his death on August 1, 1917. They were both buried in the Cornett Family Cemetery on Big Branch.

Jeptha Cornett (4/23/1875-3/7/1919) was born April 23, 1875 on Big Branch, near Hindman, KY, a son of Susanna Caudill and Joseph. Cornett.

Jeptha met and married Ruthenia Smith (7/16/1881-9/8/1967), daughter of Nancy Owens and Samuel Smith. Ruthenia and Jeptha had eight children: Susie (6/6/1899-6/25/1987) who married John Terry; Sylvania (2/7/1901-3/9/1918) who died of the flu shortly before her 18th birthday, and who was engaged to be married; Melvin James (1/13/1903-11/13/1990) who married Martha Madden; Watson E. (2/16/1905-7/10/1982) who married Herma Everage; William Dennis (4/8/1909-7/7/1988) who married Maude Lee Lawson; Henry Delmas (4/21/1911-6/30/1979) who married Hazel Davidson; Gordon (born/died 12/26/1917); and Orpba (born 2/3/1919) who married James Edward Bentley.

After Jep died on March 7, 1919 from complications of the flu, Ruthenia Cornett married Alex Bentley in 1924. Alex had four children from a previous marriage; two boys and two girls. Only one daughter named Sadie Bentley lived to be an adult. She left Knott County at an early age and moved to the state of Washington and then to Oregon where she died in May 1993. Ruthenia and Alex also adopted a little girl named Dallie Bentley when she was about six months old. Alex was killed by a train while working in the state of Washington.

Ruthenia Cornett Bentley remained active in the community and was well known throughout Knott County. She continued to live in the family home on Big Branch until her death on September 8, 1967. She was buried at the Cornett Family Cemetery on Big Branch, near Hindman, KY. Helen Cornett Downing

Revolutionary War Pension Application of William Cornett

File Number W. 6723

State of Kentucky, Perry County

On this 12th day of August, 1833, personally appeared in open court before this Justice of the County Court of Perry County now sitting William Cornett a resident of County & State aged 71 years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his Oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832. That he entered the service of the United States as a volunteer as he now believes in the year 1779 for the term of six months in Buckingham County Va. under Capt. Anthony Winston in the Reg't. commanded by Co. Skipper?, Joses was the Major, his Lieut. was Arch Walker Ensign John Garraway Sargeant Stephen Bostick on the line of the State of Va. under Gen'l. Lawson of Prince Edward County - in this town he marched through Buckingham down to the Eastern Shores & Continued in Service until his term of six months expired when he was honorably discharged at Manlin? Hills in Va. in 1780 by Capt Winston. On this route he remembers no regular officers. He afterward in 1780 as he believes was drafted for six months in Buckingham County, Va. where he then lived and served under Capt. Sanders Maj. Garraway Col Patterson, his Liet. was Anthony Hockett Ensign Thos Gregory. From Buckingham they marched down to the Eastern Shores in State where he remained in service until his term of six months expired when he was honorably discharged by Capt Sanders at the White Oak Springs 1781 near Little York shortly before Lord Cornwallis was taken. He remembers on this route Gen'l Washington and other regular officers but don't recollect their names. He knows of no person now living by whom he can prove his service as aforsaid. He was born in Henrico County Va. His discharge, he has long since lost. Since the Revolution he lived in Va. & for many years past in Kentucky where he now lives. He hearby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension role of the Agency of any State.

Sworn to & Subscribed the day & year aforesaid.

Revolutionary War pension file number W6723, William Cornett, contains some 135 pages of documentation. That documentation pertains primarily to the effort by William's widow to obtain a pension following legislation dated 2 Feb 1848 making provisions for such claims by widows who had married the veteran prior to 1800.

A summary of the major events/data recorded in the pension file is:

As shown above, <u>nine</u> of the depositions supporting Mary's application for a pension were executed AFTER her death! The file contains no timely notification of the 'eath to the Commissioner of Pensions. That fact is underscored by the 16 Sep 1853 approval of a pension for Mary, granting \$40.00 per annum, retroactive to 4 Mar 1848! Her pension was granted almost <u>twenty months</u> after her death.

In a letter dated 5 Oct 1853, Isaac Caldwell, Agent, requested instructions regarding payment on Mary's pension, who had died in Jan 1852.

Jesse Combs, Clerk of the Perry County Court, wrote to the Commissioner on 24 Mar 1854, certifying the death of Mary Cornett on 28 Jan 1852, and listed her heirs as Robert, Nancy, Roger, Samuel, Nathaniel, Rachael, and Joseph E. Cornitt.

L. P. Waldo, Commissioner of Pensions, cancelled Mary Cornett's pension on 9 Sep 1854.

The file contains further correspondence attempting to get the pension for Mary's heirs without success.

The last communique (chronologically) is a statement by Samuel Cornett dated 24 Dec 1881. The text is illegible on the microfilm copy from which my data was obtained.

father, an officer in the Navy, was stationed for two years. This sojourn may account for his working toward a major in classical languages at Pomona.

The chief musical influence in Dave's life comes from his maternal grandfather, an accomplished musician who has played the cello and bass in chamber-music groups and in the Long Beach Symphony—"an old-time theatre musician," Dave calls him. But as for folk music, Dave is largely self-taught. At the age of ten he began playing the guitar and has recently taken to the five-string banjo. He has learned songs from books, recordings, and many people.

Dave has had his own radio show over Pomona's station KSPC-FM, and he has sung with the Pomona College Glee Club in its annual tours of the Bay area. As yet he has not broken into the bigtime TV or night-club circuits with his folksongs. He sings now and then for church and club groups. He plans to become a teacher and intends to continue his folk music as a side line. An excellent idea, for trained teachers are much in demand, and skilled amateur singers of folksongs are always good company!

BANJO BILL CORNETT

Bill Cornett—banjoist, folksinger, farmer, and country storekeeper—was born in Hindman, Kentucky, July 2, 1890. His formal education ended with the eighth grade. But his folk-music activity, which began when he was a very small boy, has continued for about sixty years. He learned folksongs from his mother and his grandfather. His first performance was at Christmastime in 1895, in the court-house at Hindman, Kentucky.

Besides knowing an almost indeterminable number of old ballads, he has himself composed and sung a goodly number on local subjects: one about a double murder in a neighboring county, another about a disastrous hotel fire in Hazard, Kentucky, and another—one of his favorites—about a drunken driver who ran over and killed his own small son.²⁷ Bill Cornett has sung and played in fourteen states, has been on many radio and other programs, including the National Folk Festival in St. Louis. Known widely as Banjo Bill, he also plays the guitar and fiddle.

Bill Cornett was married to Malissa Combs on October 25, 1913. They have ten children, all born at Hindman and all grown now. Six of the children are graduates of Morehead (Kentucky) State Teachers College. One daughter, Mrs. Lake Cornett Cooper, has taught mathematics at the University of Kentucky and is completing a doctorate in mathematics.²⁸ Bill would like to get more of his songs on records, or perhaps someday publish a book of ballads he has

collected. But, he reports, "It took all my earnings to raise and school

my children."

During the summer of 1955 Bill Cornett made a successful venture into politics: he was elected to the state legislature from his district, winning by 589 votes. (Once earlier he had been defeated for the same post.) He has sung and played folk music for so many years that a session in the legislature will not greatly change his musical life.

GRACE CRESWELL

Though Nashville, Tennessee, is often called the nation's hillbilly capital, it is worth mention also as the home of some genuine folksingers-none more authentic than Grace Creswell. Born Grace Weaver on October 11, 1919, in the Glen Alpine Community of Tennessee, her family had lived in the Tennessee Valley for seven generations and farmed the land now inundated by the Tennessee Valley Authority. Since Glen Alpine was just a cove and post office, Grace Weaver got her high-school education in the small town of Clinton, Tennessee.

In some ways, however, the family heritage was more important than any schooling. And among the Weavers and the Wallaces (her maternal grandparents), singing was a natural activity. Grace learned from many members of her family-her mother, brothers, sisters, aunts, and grandparents. Her memory goes back to the age of three, when she sang "Wondrous Love" at a church gathering, and

she has been singing ever since.

After Clinton the family moved to Knoxville, Tennessee, where her father worked as a carpenter. In 1940, Grace Weaver married George Creswell. They moved to Chicago for a time, then back to Tennessee, in Nashville, where they now live. They have two children: Cindy, born in 1943, and Dick, born in 1948. Grace Creswell's first public, full program of folksongs dates from 1951, when she gave a recital at Western Kentucky State College at Bowling Green. Karl Kershaw, Tennessee painter, is credited with "discovering" her folksinging talents. As he was doing her portrait and noticing that she appeared strangely sad, he asked her to sing. To his surprise, she gave forth with some folksongs, sad but genuinely beautiful. So began her public career.

Most members of her family had played some musical instrument, and Mrs. Creswell plays the dulcimer, autoharp, and guitar. The first she uses mostly at home, the others on trips. And like most good folksingers, she often sings without accompaniment. Grace Creswell doesn't compose music and she is not a collector, though occasionally Perry County Berth 1852-1859
